**Read:** Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

The chief jailer paid no heed to anything that was in Joseph's care, because the Lord was with him; and whatever he did, the Lord made it prosper. (Genesis 39:23)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Joseph was in an impossible situation: lie with the master's wife or reject her. Both options would lead to prison. But Joseph chose integrity, which would ultimately lead to unparalleled prosperity.



**Connect:** Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- What systems are in place in your community that serve to oppress? What systems deliver from oppression?
- How does God bless others through you? What gifts do you bring to those around you?
- For the littles: Play and pretend you are in jail. How does it feel to be locked up? God can set us free!



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God set you free. Amen.



**Do:** By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Use your gifts to serve others this week. If you play an instrument, play it at a nursing home. If you are good with finances, offer to help someone manage their debt. Be creative! God gave you your gifts for a purpose!

## TIME FOR THE CHILD WITHIN US: Integrity

Today our scripture lesson is one we rarely read—it is part of Old Testament story of Joseph. From our Sunday School lessons, we might remember Joseph as the beloved son who was given a beautiful, multicolored coat to wear by his father—creating great jealousy amongst his brothers. We might remember Joseph as the young man sold into slavery in Egypt by those jealous brothers. We might remember that Joseph, once he got to Egypt, was renowned for his wisdom and the guidance he gave to the Egyptian Pharaoh.

However, we might not remember today's story—the story of Joseph being thrown into jail for a crime he didn't commit. He was falsely accused by Pharaoh's wife and sent to prison for at least two years. In the weeks leading up to his arrest, Joseph refused to do the wrong thing. He was honest. He had integrity.

(NRSV)


Now Joseph was taken down to Egypt, and Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh, the captain of the guard, an Egyptian, bought him from the Ishmaelites who had brought him down there. <sup>2</sup> The Lord was with

Joseph, and he became a successful man; he was in the house of his Egyptian master. <sup>3</sup> His master saw that the Lord was with him, and that the Lord caused all that he did to prosper in his hands. <sup>4</sup> So Joseph found favor in his sight and attended him; he made him overseer of his house and put him in charge of all that he had. <sup>5</sup> From the time that he made him overseer in his house and over all that he had, the Lord blessed the Egyptian's house for Joseph's sake; the blessing of the Lord was on all that he had, in house and field. <sup>6</sup> So he left all that he had in Joseph's charge; and, with him there, he had no concern for anything but the food that he ate.

Now Joseph was handsome and good-looking. 7 And after a time his master's wife cast her eyes on Joseph and said, "Lie with me." 8 But he refused and said to his master's wife, "Look, with me here, my master has no concern about anything in the house, and he has put everything that he has in my hand. 9 He is not greater in this house than I am, nor has he kept back anything from me except yourself, because you are his wife. How then could I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" 10 And although she spoke to Joseph day after day, he would not consent to lie beside her or to be with her. 11 One day, however, when he went into the house to do his work, and while no one else was in the house, 12 she caught hold of his garment, saying, "Lie with me!" But he left his garment in her hand, and fled and ran outside. 13 When she saw that he had left his garment in her hand and had fled outside, <sup>14</sup> she called out to the members of her household and said to them, "See, my husband has brought among us a Hebrew to insult us! He came in to me to lie with me, and I cried out with a loud voice; 15 and when he heard me raise my voice and cry out, he left his garment beside me, and fled outside." 16 Then she kept his garment by her until his master came home, 17 and she told him the same story, saying, "The Hebrew servant, whom you have brought among us, came in to me to insult me; 18 but as soon as I raised my voice and cried out, he left his garment beside me, and fled outside."

<sup>19</sup> When his master heard the words that his wife spoke to him, saying, "This is the way your servant treated me," he became enraged. <sup>20</sup> And Joseph's master took him and put him into the prison, the place where the king's prisoners were confined; he remained there in prison. <sup>21</sup> But the Lord was with Joseph and showed him steadfast love; he gave him

favor in the sight of the chief jailer. <sup>22</sup> The chief jailer committed to Joseph's care all the prisoners who were in the prison, and whatever was done there, he was the one who did it. <sup>23</sup> The chief jailer paid no heed to anything that was in Joseph's care, because the Lord was with him; and whatever he did, the Lord made it prosper.

#### **SERMON**

At the church of my childhood: Faith United Church of Christ in Bryan, TX, third graders were given their Bibles NOT at the beginning of the Sunday School year, but closer to Christmastime. Though it was 50 years ago, I remember that Sunday as if it was yesterday. I was so thrilled to have my very own Bible, that I spent that whole Sunday afternoon reading the entire Joseph narrative from Genesis. Beginning in chapter 37, Joseph's story goes all the way to chapter 50—to the very end of Genesis.

As I said in the Children's Moment, most of us know parts of Joseph's story, but most likely not the whole thing. Today's scripture lesson is one of those more-forgotten stories. At first glance, it seems an odd one to read aloud in worship—especially the false accusations of sexual assault. Yet—here we are. A story of honesty. A story of integrity. A story of God's presence and faithfulness.

Last week's scripture lesson was part of the Old Testament story of Abraham and God's promise to him that he and his descendants would become blessings to all of humanity. During worship, we explored what it means to be a blessing to others—to live fully into God's blessings.

Today's story of Joseph echoes those blessings. From childhood and into adulthood, Joseph was blessed by God, blessed by his father, and lived fully into those blessings. Now, you would THINK that with all that happened to Joseph in his life, he would turn away from God, away from his blessings. Sold into slavery by his brothers. Tossed into jail falsely by Pharaoh. Yet, Joseph never turned bitter. He anchored his life in God's love—no matter his life circumstances.

We know that is not easy. When life goes swimmingly, resting certain in God's love is seamless. Yet, when the roads become rough: when loved ones are sick, when death makes itself at home in our lives, when we lose jobs, livelihoods and friends, when it feels as if a dark cloud is obscuring God's LIGHT, when these happen, we often feel abandoned by God. We feel lost and alone and forgotten.

Those might be our feelings, but it is not God's way. God promises us his presence in good times and in bad. God promises to never leave us alone. Hear me well: God does not withhold his love for any reason. God does not abandon us. Ever.

In my own life, when I am afraid or feeling lost or alone, I sing this song aloud:

Yahweh is the God of my salvation.

I trust in him and have no fear.

I sing of the joy which his love gives to me

And I draw deeply from the springs of his great kindness.

I trust in God and have no fear.

Joseph, too, placed his trust in God—even from prison. Despite the false imprisonment, Joseph never lost his faith in God.

It is the same for each of us. Our Christian faith affirms that, through Jesus, we are loved extravagantly and are never abandoned. Our worship reflects this. Until this fall, when we prayed the pastoral prayer, our response each week was, "Hear our prayer." Now, the language of

our prayer has shifted. Instead of asking God to hear our prayers, we have been responding each week, "You hear our prayer."

It is a subtle change, but an important one. Our prayers each week include the reminder that God hears our prayers and is present with us always. We need NOT ask God to show up in our lives. He is already there.

He is already there.

And yet. Perhaps you are traveling a difficult road. Perhaps you are dealing with grief or fear or a difficult diagnosis or anger or bitterness. Perhaps you feel falsely accused and are trapped and seemingly in the prison of your life. This is what I have to say to you. You are not alone. God is with you. And yet—when the walls are closing in, when the doors to opportunity are slammed shut and locked, when we are without direction or hope, it is most difficult to experience the presence of God.

This is what I say to you today: In hard times, stay alert for God's presence through people, through nature, through the whispered wind of the Spirit. Sometimes, God speaks to us in a song on the radio or through the encouragement of a stranger. Sometimes, God's love is made real in our lives through the kindness of a loved one or song of birds in the early morning.

It is so incredibly difficult for us mere mortals, we humans, to grasp the concept of God's love. That's why God sent us Jesus. That is what incarnation is all about. To quote Eugene Peterson's rendering at the beginning of the Gospel of John, *The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood.* In other words, through Jesus, God became human so that we might experience his love right here, right now, in our ordinary lives.

What does this mean for us? It is our calling as followers of Jesus to show God's love to others: each and every day. It is our sacred duty to offer grace and forgiveness to all—not just those we consider "worthy." Just as we can look for God's love around us, we are also challenged to BE love to others. All the others. Especially those who are experiencing loss and sickness and imprisonment and terror.

So back to Joseph. Joseph never lost his love of God. He was so connected to the Creator of the Universe that throughout his life, he had prophetic dreams AND he could interpret others' dreams. Even in jail, Joseph became a leader. After about two years in prison, he was released and he went back to serving Pharaoh. His dreams continued. Joseph prospered and flourished.

In his later years, when his homeland experienced a devastating drought, Joseph's brothers traveled to Egypt to ask for assistance. What the brothers did NOT know was that Joseph—the brother they sold into slavery—was alive and well. Ultimately, Joseph revealed himself to his brothers and they reconciled.

This serves as a reminder to us that the prisons of our lives do not last forever. The key to your prison door is found in God's presence: incarnate in love and joy, mercy and grace. Likewise, you are called to hand the prison key to those who need it most.

Yahweh is the God of my salvation.

I trust in him and have no fear.

I sing of the joy which his love gives to me

And I draw deeply from the springs of his great kindness.

Let us, like Joseph, draw deeply from the springs of God's kindness, love and joy. Amen.
