May God bless you with healthy rules. Amen.




Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.



OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Exodus 20:1-21

(NRSV)

Then God spoke all these words:

² I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; ³ you shall have no other gods before me.

⁴ You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. ⁵ You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, ⁶ but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

⁷ You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

⁸ Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. ⁹ Six days you shall labor and do all your work. ¹⁰ But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. ¹¹ For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

- ¹² Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you.

 - ¹⁴ You shall not commit adultery.
 - ¹⁵ You shall not steal.
 - ¹⁶ You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- ¹⁷ You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.
- ¹⁸ When all the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking, they were afraid and trembled and stood at a distance, ¹⁹ and said to Moses, "You speak to us, and we will listen; but do not let God speak to us, or we will die." ²⁰ Moses said to the people, "Do not be afraid; for God has come only to test you and to put the fear of him upon you so that you do not sin." ²¹ Then the people stood at a distance, while Moses drew near to the thick darkness where God was.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Matthew 22:34-40 (NRSV)

When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, ³⁵ and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. ³⁶ "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" ³⁷ He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' ³⁸ This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' ⁴⁰ On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

When our boys were young, we hosted a Rotary Exchange Student for part of a year. Fernanda came to us from Brazil, speaking very little English when she first arrived. We enrolled her in Kettering High School, launching her into her American experience. When she enrolled in high school, Fernanda signed up for Spanish class since it is somewhat related to her native Portuguese. And, like all other high school students, she had to take English.

One of Fernanda's homework assignments in English class was to write a sonnet. I'll be honest: until she came home needing assistance to write it, neither Jim nor I had given much thought to how sonnets are written.

This is what we learned about the poetry form of the sonnet: It is a poem that has fourteen lines and follows a strict rhyming pattern and very specific structure. Poets who write sonnets are sometimes called sonneteers and the exacting structure of the sonnet provides a framework for the poet to write within.

The Ten Commandments are much the same. They were given to the Hebrew people by God as a framework, as guidelines, to live within. Like those early Hebrews, we who are called to follow the Ten Commandments, are free to live life fully—while staying within the structure of these commandments. In a way, our very lives are a sonnet—we are free to write whatever we choose as long as we stay within the structure provided by the Holy One.

The Hebrew people received these commandments from God once they had wandered in the wilderness for 40 years and FINALLY, FINALLY reached the Promised Land. They had fled slavery in Egypt, but they were still a rag-tag bunch of former captives who did not know how to move forward with their lives. They did not know how to live with the freedom that was now theirs in the Promised Land.

It is much the same for us. We are people who seem to enjoy the comfort of captivity more than freedom given to us in Jesus. We carefully nurse our hardened hearts. We hold onto addictions and broken relationships. More often than not, we find ourselves wandering aimlessly in the wilderness, unable to let go of that which holds us captive.

So what did God do to help the Hebrew people live fully into the freedom he intended for his chosen ones? He gave them the Ten Commandments—specific guidelines on how they (and we) are to love God and love others.

The first four commandments focus on God: not using God's name falsely, not worshipping or creating false gods, and remembering to set aside a day for rest and worship. The last six commandments focus on our relationships with others: honoring parents, not killing, betraying, or wanting that which is not ours.

For here is the deal: even as beloved children of God, we fall short of that which God commands us. Our brokenness and captivity keep us from living and loving in ways that bring wholeness and healing to ourselves and others.

Jesus knew this. In our New Testament lesson, we hear Jesus, in essence, distilling the Ten Commandments to these three: Love God. Love Others. Love Yourself.

We become a new person in Jesus when we let go of our broken and wandering ways and begin to love extravagantly: living into the freedom God hands to us with every breath we take. But hear me carefully: sometimes we need 40 years in the wilderness, 40 years of brokenness, in order to get the slavery/captivity out of us so that we can begin to love God, love others, and love ourselves.

Theologian Rob Bell agrees with this assessment. In his amazing book <u>Love Wins</u>, he argues that freedom comes from God's incredible love for us. Created in God's image, we are not puppets of the Creator. We are free to accept God's love AND (we confess) we are free to walk away from it. That is the very nature of love: it does not demand—it frees us and calls us to love others in freeing and unfettered ways.

So what does freedom and new life in Christ look like? What does it mean to follow Jesus?

Following Jesus, living within the freedom of the Risen Christ, is like creating a sonnet: we have been given clear guidelines, but we are free to write our lives our own ways.

Ultimately, when Jim sat down with Fernanda to work on her sonnet homework, they laughed and laughed as they put rhyming words together

in iambic pentameter. The completed sonnet was hilarious and fun and joyful: while still following the rules of the poetry form.

It is the same with each of our lives. The freedom we have in Jesus is the freedom to love and to invite others into lives of loving service. Not with coercion, but with the radical hospitality of Jesus' grace. The freedom we have in Jesus challenges us to love extravagantly, forgive extravagantly, and to give (of our time, our talents and our treasure) extravagantly. Because we have been set free of all that holds us back—we respond by following Jesus.

We follow Jesus NOT because he was anointed King with a golden crown and jewel-encrusted scepter. We follow Jesus because he is a different kind of king. A king who wears a thorny crown. A king who loves and forgives and welcomes us home—forever and always. Why? Because that is what freedom and love look like.




