October 23, 2022, David and Bathsheba 2 Samuel 11:1-5, 26-27; 12:1-9, Psalm 51:1-9

Use this resource at home to guide your household's daily devotions.

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

God of forgiveness, David betrayed your commandments and committed terrible crimes. Yet even his horrific sins were not too much for you to forgive. Remind us that there is nothing we can do that will turn you away from us. Amen.

Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

Nathan said to David, "You are the man! Thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: I anointed you king over Israel, and I rescued you from the hand of Saul; I gave you your master's house, and your master's wives into your bosom, and gave you the house of Israel and of Judah; and if that had been too little, I would have added as much more. Why have you despised the word of the Lord, to do what is evil in his sight?" (2 Samuel 12:7-9a)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

David had everything except that to which he was not entitled another man's wife. He soon learns the consequences of his desire and actions.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Where do you see power struggles within your community? In these struggles, who gets hurt? Who gains the most? How might God shape how power is distributed within your community?
- When have you committed a sin that you were unable to see? How did you come to realize your sin? What did you do next?
- For the littles: When was the last time you were punished for something? Did you deserve it? God knows when we sin. God also forgives our sin. Always!

Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God see your sin and forgive it. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Write a letter forgiving someone of a sin they committed against you. You need not send it; simply write it and see how your forgiveness shapes your attitude this week.





NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: James 5:7-18

Be patient, therefore, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains.⁸ You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near.⁹ Brothers and sisters, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! ¹⁰ As an example of suffering and patience, brothers and sisters, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord. ¹¹ Indeed, we call blessed those who showed endurance. You have heard of the endurance of Job, and you have seen the outcome that the Lord brought about, for the Lord is compassionate and merciful.¹² Above all, brothers and sisters, do not swear, either by heaven or by earth or by any other oath, but let your "Yes" be yes and your "No" be no, so that you may not fall under condemnation.¹³ Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up, and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. ¹⁶ Therefore confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. ¹⁷ Elijah was a human like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. ¹⁸ Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth yielded its harvest.

SCRIPTURE RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God! People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God! SERMON

I started college as a deaf education major. Until I switched gears at the end of my second year, I took a whole variety of courses meant to prepare budding teachers for the classroom. One semester, I took Science for Education Majors—a course that was less book learning and more hands-on experiments in preparation for us to teach science in the near future. I loved that class. We did lots of fun activities—mostly geared for younger elementary classrooms.

The project I remember most from that class speaks to today's stewardship topic: Taking Root. For this experiment, we each carefully inserted into a gallon Ziploc bag a fairly thick, flattened, and very wet paper towel. We stapled through the bag/wet towel horizontally about halfway down the bag. Placing bean seeds in the bag above the staples, we then sealed up the Ziploc and hung it up in our dorm rooms near a window.

You can imagine what happened next. The wet paper towel softened the seeds to the point that they sprouted—stretching roots in one direction and leaves in the other direction. Within a little over a week, most of us had to open our Ziploc bags to set the growing bean plants free. But what was particularly cool about this project was the roots. Through the bag, we could see clearly that which is normally hidden below the soil of our gardens and in our fields.

Taking Root. Whenever I think about roots, those beans growing in a Ziploc bag are the first things that come to my mind. And yet, we know that planting seeds inside of wet Ziploc bags is not how plants are made to grow. To thrive, seeds need not only water, but healthy soil, sunshine, and other seeds. Yes. Other seeds.

Farmers and gardeners, forestry experts and horticulturists all tell us that plants do not thrive in a vacuum. They need other plants to protect each other and nourish each other in order that the crops might thrive. No one can feed a village by planting beans in Ziploc bags. We need fields and plots of beans, lots of beans, growing together, in order that the harvest might be abundant.

Taking Root. Plants need one another. Science backs this up. This past summer, while recuperating from foot surgery, I read German forestry expert Peter Wohlleben's book <u>The Hidden Life of Trees: What</u>

<u>They Feel. How They Communicate</u>. And wowzers! It was an eye-opener. Basically, Mr. Wohllenben spends 250 pages carefully outlining how plants (trees, in particular) talk with one another, feed one another, defend one another, and care for one another—through their root systems. What might look to us like a plain, ordinary root in a Ziploc bag is infinitely more complicated and connected to the rest of the field or forest.

If plants need one another to survive and thrive, so do we. When God plants us in the rich soil of his forgiveness, grace, and love, my roots touch your roots and our roots touch the roots of our neighbors. Rooted in love, we are able to feed one another, communicate with one another, protect one another, and care for each other. We thrive when ALL thrive. And, when one of us is sick or injured or blown over by the wind, our combined root systems work together to prop up the one in need of extra nourishment and love.

Taking Root. You've heard me say this many times over the years, but being a Christian means being part of a beloved community. We cannot easily follow Jesus from the confines of artificial and isolated Ziploc bags. We need each other. We need God deepening our roots, deepening our faith, that we might come to understand that loving God and loving neighbor are at the very root of what it means to be a Christian.

Today's scripture lesson from the book of James highlights what it means to be beloved community when we are rooted in the love of God we experience through Jesus. The verbs in the passage are powerful: Be patient. Strengthen your hearts. Do not grumble against one another. Do not swear. (Ooops! I'll have to work on that one!)

In other words, what I believe James is saying is that being rooted in our faith is all about how we relate to one another. And it is good advice. In Christian communities, even as one as beloved as ours, we sometimes lose patience with each other. If the pandemic has taught us one thing, it is this: we need one another. We need to care for one another AND we need to be with one another even when tempers flare and we are less than loving. We belong together. And part of that belonging is being patient with one another (and patient with ourselves)

Taking Root. The same goes for strengthening of hearts. While we DO strengthen our hearts with regular exercise, I do not believe that is

what James means. Our hearts are strengthened, supported, and encouraged through community. Isolation breaks hearts. Hearts are strengthened with connection to others.

Can you think of someone in your orbit who is experiencing isolation? Reach out to him. Give her a call. Send a note of encouragement. Leave cookies of their doorstep. Invite them over for a cup of coffee and conversation. The hearts of those around us experience healing when we reach across those chasms that threaten to keep us divided: Political divides. Religious divides. Ethnic and Racial divides. Economic divides. Age divides.

Because of Jesus, it must be our lifelong task to break down barriers, build bridges and strengthen broken hearts. Choosing isolation is no longer an option. Our roots are intertwined. Always.

Taking Root. And what about James' words about grumbling and swearing? I think it all comes down to how we use our words. Will we use our speech to build one another up or to tear each other down? Will we use our words to create joy or to destroy? Grumbling and swearing separates us from others. If I'm busy grumbling about you or about a situation, I don't need to see you as a beloved child of God. I've put on a cloak of self-righteousness and separated myself from you. Likewise, swearing breaks down rather than builds up. To remain rooted in beloved community, we need to filter our words that they might offer healing and hope.

Today's passage ends by saying that whether we are suffering, cheerful, or sick, there are things we can do to stay connected to God and to one another: We can pray. We can worship. We can sing. We can ask for anointing. No matter how we are feeling on any given day, we can always seek communion/connection.

Taking Root. I can imagine you thinking, "This is all well and good, Pastor Becky. But what does any of this have to do with stewardship?"

When we recognize our connectedness to one another and to God, when we seek community rather than isolation, we are able to celebrate our rootedness in God's love, God's grace, God's joy. Again: we cannot be Christians in isolation. The life, death, and resurrection of Jesus serves as a model that nothing, nothing can separate us from God's love. And for that, we rejoice. We rejoice in our worship. In our service to others. In our laughing and crying. We rejoice in the deep roots of love that bind us to one another. Stewardship: that joyful giving of one's time, talent and treasure is a fruit of our rootedness. Specifically, when we give of our finances for the mission and ministries of St. Paul Church, we are affirming our connection to God and to one another. We cannot serve this community in isolation. We can only do what we do as a faith community. Together. And that includes our financial gifts.

Friends: no longer are you planted in a Ziploc bag. You are planted in God's garden. Our deep and spreading roots nourish and protect, communicate and commune with one another—reminding us that we are in this together.

We are in this together. Amen.






