Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6:8)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Israel was again threatened because of their sin. What sacrifices would God require to save them? God demanded no sacrifices; rather, God wanted justice, kindness, and that they walk humbly alongside God.

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Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- How are the actions of your community/culture punished or rewarded? How can you influence your community's behaviors so that they more closely match God's ways?
- How do you act with justice, kindness, and humility? What can you do this week to make improvements in those areas of your life?
- For the littles: What do you do that shows kindness to others? God asks us to be just (fair), kind, and humble (not selfish).



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God fill you with justice, kindness, and humility. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Perform an act of justice, kindness, or humility for a stranger at least once each day this week. Make a note of how your behavior shapes your attitude.



SERMON

Harvest

What Gift Can We Bring 685



Throughout this past year at the end of announcements each Sunday, we have lifted up ministries and missions of St. Paul Church under five different categories: Planting Seeds, Taking Root, Rain Come Down, Thriving, and Harvest. The intent is to highlight the ways we, as this particular Body of Christ, are working in God's garden to bring about the Kingdom in this community and throughout the world.

During our stewardship season, we have taken these same five categories to serve as examples on how our generosity to the ministries and missions of St. Paul also helps grow the Kingdom. The first week, we spoke of Planting Seeds. Our children and youth talked about the seeds of love we plant in our congregation, in our schools, our families, and our community. You received seed packets in your weekly mailing and in worship that Sunday.

So I ask you: what seeds of God's Kingdom have you planted this autumn?

What do you hope to plant in the coming year to be part of Kingdom building?

How do you intend to give of your time, talents, and treasure as we work together in the garden God has gifted to us?

Throughout today's sermon, we will pause, on occasion, to sing a verse of *What Gift Can We Bring*—number 685 in our hymnal. As we imagine how we will plant seeds in the coming year, let us sing verse one.

What gift can we bring, what present, what token?

What words can convey it—the joy of this day?

When grateful we come, remembering, rejoicing,

What song can we offer in honor and praise?

During our second week of stewardship, we focused on Taking Root. We explored how we are deeply rooted in God's love, in the grace of Christ Jesus, and the gentle wind of the Spirit. When we allow our lives to be planted in God's good soil, we cannot help but take root, spreading our roots—all underground—so that no one can see what is happening on the surface. And yet, deep roots assure that the plant above ground is thriving.

We root ourselves in our Christian faith through worship, Bible Study, prayer, teaching, learning, and service to others. We root ourselves in

Jesus by doing as he did—loving God and loving our neighbors. We root ourselves to St. Paul Church when we remember our past, celebrating the gift it is to us today.

Next year, 2023, we will celebrate St. Paul's 190th anniversary. Can you believe it? For nearly two centuries, St. Paul Church has been rooted in this community, serving others joyfully and lovingly. Your generosity toward St. Paul Church for the coming year will carry on the legacy of rootedness in this community and the legacies of service and love we value.

I ask you: What is taking root in your life? How can you nurture that seedling that it might grow and flourish? How might your generosity help your faith-roots deepen?

Let us sing verse two.

Give thanks for the Past, for those who had vision, Who planted and watered so dreams could come true. Give thanks for the Now, for study, for worship, For mission that bids us turn prayer into deed.

On week three of this stewardship season, we remembered those who died—by naming their names and lighting candles in their memories on All Saints Sunday. That was the week our worship focused on Rain Come Down—a most fitting Sunday to see rain as tears falling upon the earth, to see the rain as nourishing the earth, to see the rain as washing us clean and making us new.

Think back to when you were a child, playing, dancing, stomping, running in the rain. Did you and your friends ever race each other as the rain came pouring down? What was it like, to race in the rain? Do you remember running fast—faster than you thought possible—as your friends were also racing at top speed? Perhaps there was a stitch in your side, but you kept running. Then, when you crossed the finish line, you collapsed onto the wet grass, rain soaking your face.

Generous giving is like that: a delightful combination of effort/stretching that leads to joy. As Christians, we are called to give and give so generously that we experience that joy—a joy that rains not only upon this congregation, but upon our community, nation, and world.

When the rains come down at all the right times, when our giving pushes us to broaden our definition of "generosity," we begin to thrive. On week four of stewardship season, we focused worship on Thriving. The garden God plants in our hearts needs to do more than survive—it needs to thrive and flourish and grow with abandon.

When we thrive, when our congregation thrives, when our community and nation thrive, we are able to tap into the joy that God intends for all his creation.

When we are thriving, we are able to shift from a scarcity mode (never enough for everyone) to a generosity mode (enough for everyone!), we are filled with the Holy Spirit who causes us to dream—and dream big—about the future.

I ask you:

When you are thriving/living your best life, what can you offer to others?

As we thrive as a congregation, where do you see God leading us in the coming years?

Looking to the future, let us sing verse three.

Give thanks for Tomorrow, full of surprises, For knowing whatever Tomorrow may bring, God gives us his word that always, forever, We rest in his keeping and live in his love.

All of this singing and reflection brings us to this moment: the moment of Harvest—when we are summoned to the fields by God to harvest what has been planted. Today's New Testament lesson reminds us that the harvest is ready. This, in turn, means we need to be ready to go into the fields and harvest, to be willing to go into our neighborhoods to share God's love, to be ready to take action on behalf of those our society has tossed aside.

Our Old Testament lesson echoes this. God is not impressed with ritual sacrifice. The harvest/the sacrifice God wants from each of us is this: to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with God.

The dollars we pledge to St. Paul Church for the coming year must do exactly that: seek justice, show kindness, and live humbly. In other words, our financial giving creates spaces for the oppressed to experience freedom, for the reviled to experience kindness, and for each of us to humbly work toward God's Kingdom.

In a few moments, you will be invited to bring your pledge card forward. You have been given the gift of these five weeks to imagine how St. Paul Church can plant seeds, take root, be baptized by water and Holy Spirit and rain, & thrive—all leading to a wondrous harvest in 2023 and beyond.

As we look to the future (which belongs to God!), let us sing verse four.

This gift we now bring, this present, this token,
These words can convey it—the joy of this day!
When grateful we come, remembering, rejoicing,
This song we now offer in honor and praise!
Let us join the harvest of justice and joy! Amen.

OFFERING AND DEDICATING OUR 2023 PLEDGES TO GOD

Once a year, St. Paul UCC members and friends make financial commitments to the mission and ministries of our congregation for the coming year. For five weeks, we have focused worship around our stewardship theme: Planting Seeds, Taking Root, Rain Come Down, Thriving, and Harvest.

If you are a guest with us today, don't be uncomfortable. This commitment service is something we do each year—reminding us that we are called to offer our whole lives to God.

If you are a member and do not wish to complete a pledge card, we do not want you to feel pressured to do so. We do hope you will consider this, but it is a voluntary process.

Journalist B.C. Forbes once said, "The be-all and end-all of life should not be to get rich, but to enrich the world." We enrich the world through our joyful generosity of our time, our talents, our treasures. Generosity is not one aspect of life apart from the rest of life. Generosity is a way of living, not only a way of giving.

In your pews you will find pledge cards. I invite you to take a moment now to complete the information on the cards. You will notice that the pledge cards are in three parts. One portion you keep for your records. On another portion you record your name. On the third portion you write the percentage of your income you prayerfully commit to give to the missions and ministries of St. Paul for 2023.

Each time we celebrate the Lord's Supper—Holy Communion—we take in our hands a small piece of bread and a small cup with ordinary grape juice or wine. During those moments, these common elements symbolize the deepest meanings of our faith. Similarily, during the next few minutes when we take an ordinary pencil and a small card, these symbolizing the high and holy commitment we make in response to the love God has given each of us.

Pope Francis once said: *Money has to serve, not to rule*. We are entrusted to care for all of God's creation—and that includes our financial resources. Take a moment to complete your cards. Then bring your cards forward, placing your name card in one basket and your giving card in the second basket.


PRAYER OF DEDICATION (in unison)
