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Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- How do you suppose God decides how to arbitrate when communities are at odds with each other?
- When have you trusted in God at a time when trusting took great courage? How did it turn out?
- For the littles: Would you rather climb a tall mountain or swim in a deep ocean? Why?

May God rejoice with you on the mountaintop. Amen.







Today is Christ the King Sunday/Reign of Christ Sunday. It is the last day of our church calendar year. We shift today from the Pentecost/Ordinary season. Next Sunday is the beginning of the church/liturgical year—the first Sunday of Advent.

What is awesome about Christ the King Sunday is that Jesus is a different kind of King. He doesn't wear a royal robe and a golden crown. He doesn't hold a scepter in his hand. He doesn't ride a chariot. Our King Jesus wears a simple robe, a crown of thorns, and carries a shepherd's crook. King Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday on the back of a donkey.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON INTRODUCTION

Today's Narrative Lectionary reading is not one we have heard before. It is an obscure story with lots of difficult-to-pronounce names. With that in mind, I'm going to give an introduction to the story so that it might make more sense once you hear it in a few moments.

Some definitions/roles you need to know. I begin with Rabshakeh. This person, within the Assyrian royal court, was the chief cup-bearer to the King—the man whose royal duty to pour the King his drinks. In today's story, the Rabshakeh was also the spokesperson for the Assyrian King.

King Hezekiah was the King of Judah (the southern kingdom). Shebna was King Hezekiah's finance minister. Eliakim was the man who would ultimately replace Shebna as recorder at a later time. Joah was the royal recorder.

This is what was happening in today's scripture lesson: Assyria was on Jerusalem's doorstep. The mighty Assyrian nation had already torn through the countryside conquering lands despite the faith the people had in their gods. Now it was God's turn to be tested. When the Rabshakeh, the royal cup-bearer, called out Israel, pointing out the futility of trusting in God, Judah's King Hezekiah crumbled. It was one thing to trust God when Assyria was still far away. But now Assyria was here. It was time for God to show up.

King Hezekiah sent Eliakim and the recorder, Shebna, to the prophet Isaiah. The story tells us these men were covered in sackcloth (the clothing of repentance and despair). Isaiah once again had to reassure the king that God would remain faithful to them. God would become the God of all nations one day. One day. We would later learn that Assyria **would** conquer Jerusalem. We would also learn that God would become God of all nations. Maybe it took their defeat and then restoration for the word of God's power and reign to reach all the lands. God's people would one day once again use their weapons as tools for cultivating the land. Weapons of war would become tools for farmers.

Interestingly, when the Assyrian Rabshakeh threatened Jerusalem, he offered them a way out. If they surrendered (and even if they didn't), he promised them that they could remain on their land. Until the day they couldn't. Then they would be moved to another land, but one very much like their own land. Their lives would hardly change at all, promised the Rabshakeh.

Today we will read the scripture in a skit format. Your speaking part is that of the "people."

Narrator: In the fourteenth year of King Hezekiah, King Sennacherib of Assyria came up against all the fortified cities of Judah and captured them. The king of Assyria sent the Rabshakeh from Lachish to King Hezekiah at Jerusalem with a great army. He stood by the conduit of the upper pool on the highway to the Fuller's Field. And there came out to him Eliakim son of Hilkiah, who was in charge of the palace, and Shebna the secretary, and Joah son of Asaph, the recorder. Then Rabshakeh stood and called out in a loud voice in the language of Judah,

Rabshakeh: Hear the words of the great king, the king of Assyria! Thus says the king:

King: Do not let Hezekiah deceive you, for he will not be able to deliver you. Do not let Hezekiah make you rely on the Lord by saying, The Lord will surely deliver us; this city will not be given into the hand of the king of Assyria.

Rabshakeh: Do not listen to Hezekiah; for thus says the king of Assyria:

King: Make your peace with me and come out to me; then everyone of you will eat from your own vine and your own fig tree and drink water from your own cistern, until I come and take you away to a land like your own land, a land of grain and wine, a land of bread and vineyards. Do not let Hezekiah mislead you by saying, The Lord will save us. Has any of the gods of the nations saved their land out of the hand of the King of Assyria? Where are the gods of Hamath and Arpad? Where are the gods of Sepharvaim? Have them delivered Samaria out of my hand? Who among all the gods of these countries have saved their countries out of my hand, that the Lord should save Jerusalem out of my hand?

Narrator: When King Hezekiah heard it, he tore his clothes, covered himself with sackcloth, and went into the house of the Lord. And he sent Eliakim, who was in charge of the palace, and Shebna the secretary, and the senior priests, covered with sackcloth, to the prophet Isaiah son of Amoz. They said to him:

Eliakim: Thus says Hezekiah, This is a day of distress, of rebuke, and of disgrace; children have come to the birth, and there is no strength to bring them forth. It may be that the Lord your God heard the words of Rabshakeh, whom his master the king of Assyria has sent to mock the living God, and will rebuke the words that the Lord your God has heard; therefore lift up your prayer for the remnant that is left.

Narrator: When the servants of King Hezekiah came to Isaiah, Isaiah said to them,

Isaiah: Say to your master, "Thus says the Lord: Do not be afraid because of the words that you have heard, with which the servants of the king of Assyria have reviled me. I myself will put a spirit in him, so that he shall hear a rumor, and return to his own land; I will cause him to fall by the sword in his own land."


Narrator: the word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In the days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. Many peoples shall come and say,

People: Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.

Narrator: For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples. They shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war no more.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

On Christ the King Sunday, we have the story of two kings: Sennacherib, the king of Assyria and King Hezekiah, the 13th king of Judah (the southern kingdom) over seven centuries before Jesus was born.

While today's Old Testament reading does not put King Hezekiah in a good light—we hear/read that he was shaking in his royal shoes as the Assyrian army banged upon the doors of Jerusalem. But, this you need to know about the King of Judah: Hezekiah's reign brought about needed religious reforms. He mandated that God—Yahweh—alone was to be worshiped and that no other gods were to be present in Jerusalem's Temple. In other words, during Hezekiah's reign, the king demonstrated to the Jewish people that they belong to God and to God alone.

Today's scripture lesson is a reminder that, even when things seem grim, God is ultimately in charge. God alone is worthy to be worshipped. On Christ the King Sunday, this is the bottom line. We worship NOT human kings, presidents, politicians, nor any other human in positions of power and authority. Human kingdoms are finite. God as King is eternal.

Taken at face value, we say we believe this to be true. From our earliest Sunday School lessons, we were taught that God is in charge: **not** those who wrap themselves in the trimmings and trappings of power. And yet. And yet, when the going gets difficult for us (as individuals, as a community, a nation, a world), we sometimes lose sight of God's reign on earth. When we find ourselves walking on shaky ground, we tend to question God's loving presence and promise.

Today's story echoes this. When the Assyrian army stormed in to invade Jerusalem, devout King Hezekiah was overcome with fear. For some period of time (we don't know how long), the king who cemented the worship of God and God alone in the Temple, doubted God's ability to rescue his people.

We, too, at times have been like Hezekiah. When life is good, when the sun is shining and God's melodies echo in our hearts, our faith stays on track. Even when times are tough, we ground ourselves in God's unfailing love.

Until the enemy attacks—threatening to tear down all we have built in our lives. By "enemy" I mean that which tries to knock us off our feet: disease, death, finances, politics, divorce, broken relationships, addictions. When all is well in our world, it is much easier to worship God, thanking him for his blessings/presence in our lives.

But life **does** knock us down every once in a while. These knockdowns are not God's work—they are part of the human condition. It is how we respond to life's wobbles and woes that makes all the difference.

King Hezekiah, when his world was shaken, wobbled, and grew fearful. For an undetermined amount of time, he forgot that God is forever and always ultimately in charge. If we were to look just a bit further in Isaiah, we would read that King Hezekiah became sick and was dying. He cried out to God and his life was restored. What's more, through the prophet Isaiah, God promised to send the Assyrian army packing.

In gratitude and joy, King Hezekiah sang a song to God (see Isaiah 38:9-20). The last two verses are the now-healthy king singing, *The living, the living, they thank you, as I do this day; fathers make known to children your faithfulness. The Lord will save me, and we will sing to stringed instruments all the days of our lives at the house of the Lord.*

Perhaps that needs to be the message for Reign of Christ/Christ the King Sunday. No matter our life circumstances, we can sing praises and offer thanksgiving to God.

Kings come and go. Politicians rise and fall. Kingdoms are finite, but God, the God of love, the Lord of the Universe, is worthy of our thanksgiving and praise. He is worthy of our worship. God sees human history from the viewpoint of eternity: there will be bumps and bruises, but in the end, even the weapons of war will be turned into instruments to raise food to feed the nations.

Reign of Christ/Christ the King Sunday is the last Sunday of the church liturgical year. We start a new year next Sunday—with the beginning of Advent. Reign of Christ Sunday reminds us that God chooses to come to us as a tiny Babe. God chooses to be vulnerable. God chooses to become human. I don't know about you, but THAT alone is why God is worthy of my worship and praise.

Our scripture lesson today ends by going backwards—jumping from Isaiah 36 and 37 back to Isaiah 2 and the language of swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks. Today's reading ends with verse 4. But, I want you to hear the very next verse, verse 5, which leads us directly into Advent: O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!







6. Council members and officers shall be elected **approved** at the Congregational Meeting held in December and installed on the first Sunday in January.

7. The terms of the offices shall be three years for the Trustees. and two years for all the others. Two years for Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Elders and Deacons-one year as junior and one year as senior. Vice President (one year and) will assume the duties of President for the second year of their term. Elections shall be held each year in order to fill vacancies.
