November 27, 2022, Advent I: Faith as a Way of Life Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4; 3:[3b-6], 17-19

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

God of grace and mercy, with Habakkuk we cry out to you in despair at the evil in the world. As we begin our waiting for your promised savior, give us hope that all will be made right in you. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? Why do you make me see wrong-doing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. (Habakkuk 1:2-3)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

The prophet Habakkuk saw violence and destruction all around him. Yet he chose to rejoice in a God of strength, beauty, and love.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- In what ways is your community in exile? Where do you feel your community is isolated from God? Where do you feel it is close to God?
- When has your faith in God been tested? In what ways have your beliefs changed as you learn and grow?
- For the littles: What makes you sad? God is with us when we're sad.


PRAYER OF CONFESSION (in unison)

ADVENT LESSON: Luke 1:5-24a

(NRSV)

In the days of King Herod of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly order of Abijah. His wife was descended from the daughters of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth. ⁶ Both of them were righteous before God, living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord. ⁷ But they had no children because Elizabeth was barren, and both were getting on in years.

⁸ Once when he was serving as priest before God during his section's turn of duty, ⁹ he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to enter the sanctuary of the Lord to offer incense. ¹⁰ Now at the time of the incense offering, the whole assembly of the people was praying outside. ¹¹ Then there appeared to him an angel of the Lord, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. ¹² When Zechariah saw him, he was terrified, and fear overwhelmed him. ¹³ But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will name him John. ¹⁴ You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, ¹⁵ for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit. ¹⁶ He will turn

many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. ¹⁷ With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord." ¹⁸ Zechariah said to the angel, "How can I know that this will happen? For I am an old man, and my wife is getting on in years." ¹⁹ The angel replied, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to bring you this good news. ²⁰ But now, because you did not believe my words, which will be fulfilled in their time, you will become mute, unable to speak, until the day these things occur."

²¹ Meanwhile the people were waiting for Zechariah and wondering at his delay in the sanctuary. ²² When he did come out, he was unable to speak to them, and they realized that he had seen a vision in the sanctuary. He kept motioning to them and remained unable to speak. ²³ When his time of service was ended, he returned to his home.

²⁴ After those days his wife Elizabeth conceived, and for five months she remained in seclusion.

SUNG RESPONSE

Thankful Heart

This year for Advent, much of our music is from the movie *The Muppets Christmas Carol*. If you haven't had a chance to see the movie yet, I recommend you take the time in the coming weeks to check it out.

You probably know the story of Charles Dickens' Christmas Carol. It is the story from the 1800's of Ebenezer Scrooge whose business partner, Jacob Marley, had recently died. Ebenezer Scrooge was a bitter, miserly man. His dealings with his family members and his employees was one of disdain and oppression.

In other words, Ebenezer Scrooge was a man without hope.

Throughout Dickens' novella and throughout the Muppets movie, Ebenezer Scrooge is visited one evening by three ghosts: the ghosts of Christmases past, present, and future—showing Mr. Scrooge in sharp relief the consequences of his hopelessness/hardened heart.

Hope. On the first Sunday of Advent, we focus on hope for good reason. Preparing for the birth of Christ Jesus, we place our hope in his birth. Our Greek Orthodox brothers and sisters treat Advent much like we treat Lent—as a time of sacrifice and penitence—all in preparation of the birth of Christ.

I see Advent more as a journey—a journey to Bethlehem—a journey to the stable and the heart of God.

Indeed, as we begin our journey to Bethlehem, we hear the story of Zechariah the priest and his wife, Elizabeth. Truly, it is a story of hope and promise: a perfect beginning to Advent.

We actually only hear the first part of the story in today's New Testament Lesson. We hear about Zechariah—a priest of the Temple—and his barren wife Elizabeth. While offering incense in the sanctuary, the angel Gabriel appeared to Zechariah, promising him that Elizabeth would conceive and bear a son, naming him John.

But Zechariah does not believe the angel and questions how this can be—since he and his wife are quite elderly. For doubting the Lord, the angel makes Zechariah mute for the entirety of Elizabeth's pregnancy. Elizabeth, however, is filled with joy at this unexpected blessing.

The Gospel of Luke is a gospel of reversals. Throughout Luke's Gospel, the people who are bearers of God's good news are those at the

margins: the women, the tax collectors, the lepers. Today's story follows this pattern.

Zechariah, the priest, is **not** shown as a model for faith. In fact, because of his doubt, he is rendered silent. The model of faith, instead is Elizabeth. If we had read just a little further in Luke, we would have heard the story of Mary—newly pregnant—coming to visit the heavily pregnant Elizabeth.

Do you remember what happens? When Mary greeted Elizabeth, the child in Elizabeth's womb leapt for joy. What's more, Elizabeth becomes the first prophet in Luke, proclaiming, "Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me. For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

Years ago, when I was pregnant with our oldest son, I was serving as a student pastor of two small rural churches in Illinois. During the children's moment, I told the story of the baby leaping for joy in Elizabeth's womb, telling the children that if the baby ever jumped around during a children's moment, I would let them feel my belly. (And trust me: that was a high possibility. That child spent the entire pregnancy doing laps—bouncing from one side of my belly to the next.)

The kids were thrilled by the prospect. But so, too, were the adults. As I was greeting people after the service, an elderly farmer asked if he, too, could feel the baby leaping inside: a symbol of hope and joy during Advent.

Today, we are called to be like Elizabeth—pregnant with hope and joy. We are called to proclaim Christ in our midst: as we journey to the stable AND as we experience his presence in our daily lives. We are called to place our hope in God—a God who loves us so much that he could come to us as a tiny, vulnerable baby.

Hope. Hope is not optimism or merely a feeling. It is active engagement to bring about God's kingdom here and now. We are called to spend Advent less focused on STUFF and more focused on changing lives. Is there someone in your neighborhood who could use a helping hand? Can you provide a meal or clothing or gas to a family in our

community through the Local Aid Fund? Will you donate to or volunteer at the Blessing Pantry? Will you befriend that child in your neighborhood who seems lost? Will you reach out to someone who is grieving?

I challenge you this week to put hope to work—reaching out, loving, forgiving.

Ultimately, after his three nighttime ghostly visits, Ebenezer Scrooge did the same. He turned his life around—no longer focused on his misery and miserly ways. The next morning, Christmas morning, he put hope to work—transforming the lives of those around him.

Friends: it is time to put your hope to work—for Jesus' sake. Amen.




