



SCRIPTURE LESSON: Exodus 14:5-7, 10-14, 21-29 (The Message) When the king of Egypt was told that the people were gone, he and his servants changed their minds. They said, "What have we done, letting Israel, our slave labor, go free?" So he had his chariots harnessed up and got his army together. He took six hundred of his best chariots, with the rest of the Egyptian chariots and their drivers coming along.

As Pharaoh approached, the Israelites looked up and saw them— Egyptians! Coming at them!

They were totally afraid. They cried out in terror to God. They told Moses, "Weren't the cemeteries large enough in Egypt so that you had to take us out here in the wilderness to die? What have you done to us, taking us out of Egypt? Back in Egypt didn't we tell you this would happen? Didn't we tell you, 'Leave us alone here in Egypt—we're better off as slaves in Egypt than as corpses in the wilderness."

<sup>13</sup> Moses spoke to the people: "Don't be afraid. Stand firm and watch God do his work of salvation for you today. Take a good look at the Egyptians today for you're never going to see them again.

<sup>14</sup> God will fight the battle for you.

And you? You keep your mouths shut!"

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea and God, with a terrific east wind all night long, made the sea go back. He made the sea dry ground. The seawaters split.

<sup>22-25</sup> The Israelites walked through the sea on dry ground with the waters a wall to the right and to the left. The Egyptians came after them

in full pursuit, every horse and chariot and driver of Pharaoh racing into the middle of the sea. It was now the morning watch. God looked down from the Pillar of Fire and Cloud on the Egyptian army and threw them into a panic. He clogged the wheels of their chariots; they were stuck in the mud.

The Egyptians said, "Run from Israel! God is fighting on their side and against Egypt!"

<sup>26</sup> God said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea and the waters will come back over the Egyptians, over their chariots, over their horsemen."

<sup>27-28</sup> Moses stretched his hand out over the sea: As the day broke and the Egyptians were running, the sea returned to its place as before. God dumped the Egyptians in the middle of the sea. The waters returned, drowning the chariots and riders of Pharaoh's army that had chased after Israel into the sea. Not one of them survived.

<sup>29-31</sup> But the Israelites walked right through the middle of the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall to the right and to the left. God delivered Israel that day from the oppression of the Egyptians. And Israel looked at the Egyptian dead, washed up on the shore of the sea, and realized the tremendous power that God brought against the Egyptians. The people were in reverent awe before God and trusted in God and his servant Moses.

# Lord, Please Lead

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Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

Today's reading is a familiar one for those of us who grew up going to Sunday School.

The story of the escape from Egypt by the Hebrew slaves is a tale of new beginnings. It is also a story that shows the power of God. The Egyptians recognized this power and said, "Run from Israel! God is fighting on their side and against Egypt!" As one reads the accounts of their escape from Egypt, there is a powerful sense of God being in control.

Truly, because of God's intervention on the Hebrews' behalf, Moses' job looks almost comically easy. Years ago, Mad Magazine showed several animated/comic portrayals of Moses. In one, Moses is a child in the bathtub, separating the waters, creating a dry patch in the middle of the tub—causing his mother to wonder why he never got clean! In another, Moses was parting the broth of his chicken noodle soup so he could get to his noodles first! The implication is, of course, that for Moses parting waters was a talent he'd been perfecting since childhood.

But, we know that is only part of the story. The Hebrew peoples' flight from Egypt was anything but smooth sailing. Over and over and over again, the former captives had to prove themselves worthy of a relationship with God as they wandered in the wilderness. And, over and over and over again, they blew it with God. The good news for the Hebrew people (and for us today) is that our God is gracious: he loves us, forgives us, and calls us his own—no matter what.

In all their wilderness wanderings, the Hebrew people were called to place their total faith in God—to trust that God knew the direction to the land of Canaan, trust that food and water would be provided, trust that the people would survive their wanderings to make a new home.

And what of each of us? When have you wandered in the wilderness of your heart and mind? In the midst of great expanses of desert, where have you placed your trust?

In fact, you might be wandering in the wilderness right now. Life is not what you expected it to be. You are angry. You are bitter. You are confused. You feel all alone. You wonder if God even exists.

Sometimes when we are in the wilderness, we simply must trust: trust the process, trust Moses, trust God.

I know this sounds easy—like Moses parting the bathtub waters—but we know it is not.

This is where our Christian faith comes into play in our wilderness moments. We are **not** called to pull people out of the wilderness. We are **not** called to tell people to "buck up and life will get better." We **ARE** called to walk alongside people who have lost their way. We are called to be a companion to those who are lost that they might have a living, tangible reminder that God is present with them through the good, the bad, and the ugly.

Today's scripture reading is just the very beginning of the Hebrews' wilderness wanderings. Scriptures tell us that for forty years Moses and the people wandered in the wilderness. AND, scriptures also tell us that the Hebrew people complained to Moses, complained to God, for pretty much the full forty years.

I wonder what would happen if we embraced our wilderness times? What if, instead of running away from pain, we ran **toward** the pain that it might be transformed by God?

One organization that is doing just that is called the Wilderness Way Community. Founded in 2006, a handful of Christians got together and began to imagine what an alternative church might look like that focused on those who are typically unwelcomed in Christian churches. After six months of listening to Christians who felt unwelcomed in churches, they named their movement the Wilderness Way Community because, as Christians, they plant themselves in wilderness spaces.

As founder Solveig Nilson-Goodin once said: Biblically, the wilderness is the place outside the walls of empire, the place where prophets are called and fed, the place where manna is given and enoughness is taught, the place where John the Baptist initiated those who were defectors from and dehumanized by empire; the place where Jesus was tested and prepared for his prophetic, spiritual leadership.

The goal of the Wilderness Way Community is to assist others to break free of the boxes (and religious institutions) that have oppressed and confined so many people for centuries. The goal is to un-tame, undomesticate, and re-wild ourselves for the Gospel of Jesus Christ that is anything but tame and domesticated. As leaders of the movement say, they want people to become wild Christian disciples and fearless spiritual leaders.

Think about that for a moment. My guess is very few of us got up this morning planning to be **wild** in our Christian discipleship and fearless in our leadership. We have spent our lives being tamed into boxes and institutions and rituals that have squashed the wilderness out of us.

What might your prayer life look like if you took it to the wilderness? What might your walk with Jesus look like if you followed him into the desert?

Remember this: John the Baptist was shaped and formed in the wilderness. Jesus began his ministry in the wilderness, tempted by Satan. I would argue that Jesus had to have that wilderness time/that confrontation with the devil that he might become our Savior and Friend.

A little less than a year ago, I drove to a weekend retreat in North Carolina—exhausted and burned out from ministry in Covid times. I wasn't sure I could continue this ministry path and needed a break and a breather. The retreat was put on by a global organization called Tumbah—a nonprofit committed to bringing diverse people together from around the world.

The retreat I attended was called Wild of the Called. NOT Call of the Wild. Throughout the weekend, we explored what it means to live outside the box, to BE wild and still be faithful to our calling as followers of Jesus. I returned home refreshed and ready to be wild and faithful and joyful and loving—no matter the circumstances.

The Wilderness Way Community echoes this revelation. Society tends to want us to conform, be the same, do what we have always done, with no deviation. Yet, we know this instinctively: life lived inside boxes can lead to despair. The Wilderness Way Community reminds Christians that we find our strength in the power of God, the power of life, that can never ever be fully domesticated or extinguished. Our resurrection faith reminds us that God so loved the world that he even conquered death. Friends, it doesn't get any wilder than that!

Moses led the Hebrews out of slavery and into the wilderness. And God was there. The Old Testament prophets often found their inspiration in the wilderness. And God was there. John the Baptist ate locusts and

wild honey in the wilderness. And God was there. Jesus was tempted by Satan in the wilderness. And God was there.


My friends: **your** wilderness experience awaits. And I promise you this: God will be with you—every step of the way. Amen


