#### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Genesis 32:22-31.

This is an amazing story. The "man" who wrestled with Jacob was actually God (vv. 28, 30). Even more, God does not win the wrestling match, and that seems to be okay with God. God honors Jacob whose name means "trickster." The trickster had deceived his father Isaac to unfairly gain his older brother's inheritance and, more importantly, the blessing that goes from Abraham and Isaac and now to Jacob instead of Esau. Like the widow in Luke 18:1-8 who persistently bothers the unjust judge to get her justice, Jacob does whatever it takes to be blessed. And God so honors that determination that God gives Jacob a new name, Israel, which in this story means "you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed" (v. 28). Jacob and God's people will now be known as Israel, a term that commends the importance of wresting with and being persistent for God's blessings. Yes, it is true that God is the more persistent one, but God wants us to pursue the divine blessing and pursue an active life of faith instead of a complacency that takes God's word and righteousness for granted. How do you pursue God in your daily life of faith? How do you wrestle with God?

*Pray:* God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, thank you for honoring our wrestling with you as faithful followers, through Christ our Lord, amen.

#### SERVICE



Psalm 121:1 asks, "From where will my help come from?" The answer in the next verse is, "My help comes from the Lord." We are God's hands and feet in the world. When you see someone less fortunate or in need, where does their help come from? It, too, comes from the Lord with your help. Who in your life could use a helping hand? Take time to reach out to them through an act of kindness and tell them that the reason you are doing so is in response to God's loving presence in your life.

#### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**



The theme this week is God's blessings. God blesses Jacob and King Melchizedek blessed Abram. The scripture readings also tell of the importance of prayer. In Luke 18:1, Jesus says to, "pray always and not lose heart". When done in the home regularly, prayers and blessings help us grow in our faith. Say a prayer at every meal and at bedtime this week as a reminder to pray always. Make it a practice to bless others this week by making the sign of the cross on

foreheads or hands as people leave for work or school and say the words:





OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Joel 2:12-14, 23-32 (NRSV)

Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the Lord, your God?

O children of Zion, be glad and rejoice in the Lord your God; for he has given the early rain for your vindication, he has poured down for you abundant rain, the early and the later rain as before. The threshing flows shall be full of grain, the vats shall overflow with wine and oil.

I will repay you for the years that the swarming locust has eaten, the hopper, the destroyer, and the cutter, my great army, which I sent against you.

You shall eat in plenty and be satisfied, and praise the name of the Lord your God, who has dealt wondrously with you. And my people shall never again be put to shame. You shall know that I am in the midst of Israel, and that I, the Lord, am your God and there is no other. And people shall never again be put to shame.

Then afterward I will pour out my spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams and your young men shall see visions. Even on the male and female slaves, in those days, I will pour out my spirit.

I will show portents in the heavens and on earth, blood and fire and columns of smoke. The sun shall be turned to darkness, and the moon to blood, before the great and terrible day of the Lord comes. Then everyone

who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved; for in Mount Zion and in Jerusalem there shall be those who escape as the Lord has said, and among the survivors shall be those whom the Lord calls.

### **NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 18:9-14**

(NRSV)

Jesus told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted."

**SERMON** 

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Naomi Eisenberger was a doctoral candidate at the University of California/Los Angeles, when she published her research in the journal "Science" twenty years ago. In the article, Ms. Eisenberger and her colleagues discovered that the brain reacts to social rejection—the pain of a broken heart—the same way the brain reacts to physical injury.

Using a specially created computer game, test subjects were led to believe that they were playing ball with two other players on the computer network. The game included a moment when the test subject was excluded from the game/other players. When this happened, the researchers explained that a "computer glitch" had taken place. A bit later, however, as the game continued, the other (simulated/not real) players excluded the test subject from the game—making it appear the test subject had suddenly been rejected and blocked from playing the game with the group.

When it was only a "computer glitch" keeping the test subject from playing, the subject's brain did not register any kind of reaction. However, when the rejection became more personal, the computer-generated (but very real!) rejection registered its shock and distress in the anterior cingulate cortex portion of the brain—the same area that responds to physical pain.

According to Ms. Eisenberger, "these findings show how deeply rooted our need is for social connection. There is something about exclusion from others that is perceived as being harmful to our survival as something that can physically hurt us, and our body automatically knows this." In other words, at the most basic level, our physical and emotional survival depends on being included—welcomed and part of a larger group.

Instinctively, we know this to be true. As children we felt physically sick when we were not invited to the birthday party of a friend. As teenagers, the pit in our stomach and pain in our heart grew stronger when we were dumped by a boyfriend or girlfriend. As adults, we have known incredible physical pain and illness and times of great loss—death, divorce, loss of a good friend, loss of a social circle.

With this in mind, let's look to today's Old Testament lesson. We know very little about the prophet Joel. Scholars continue to debate about him to this day: was he a prophet of the Temple or an outsider? Was his time period six centuries before Christ or merely four? We simply do not know.

What we **do** know is that Joel's message, recorded in three short chapters, calls us to examine the pain in our lives. Joel calls us to examine that which swarms into our lives and rains plagues upon us that we might turn back to God, living fully within her loving embrace, within his steadfast mercy.

Plagues were certainly no stranger to the prophet Joel. In chapter one, we hear Joel say:

What the cutting locust left, the swarming locust has eaten. What the swarming locust left, the hopping locust has eaten. What the hopping locust left, the destroying locust has eaten. Its teeth are lion's teeth, and it has the fangs of a lioness. It has laid waste to my vines and splintered my fig trees.

While we rarely have such an infestation of locusts, we have certainly known plagues of pain and sorrow. Three years into this pandemic, people are still getting sick and dying. And according to the CDC, this fall we might have a perfect storm-combination of Covid19, Monkey Pox, and Polio.

Truly, we know the plagues of sudden death and lingering illness. We know the infestation of brokenness in our families and in our neighborhoods. We know the epidemic of violence toward our children and between nations. At times, it seems as if our lives are ravaged by the locusts of life—that our vines are laid to waste and our fig trees splintered.

Like Naomi Eisenberger's study about emotional rejection and loss, we too have had our hearts broken and our bodies weakened by life's sorrow-filled plagues.

This is exactly where the prophet Joel steps in. Joel's message speaks directly to a people ravaged and rejected, lost and alone. No matter the condition of our fig trees or our hearts, the prophet urges us to turn back to God. Yes, we will continue to mourn our losses, but by offering our sorrow and brokenness to Yahweh/God Almighty, we no longer need to tear our clothing in despair, but to rend/tear our hearts instead.

Joel's message forces us to stretch our 21<sup>st</sup> century sensibilities. No longer do we believe that God rains locust and disease upon us for bad behavior, yet we are still called to take the tragedies that befall us and offer them to God. It is easy to believe in God's goodness and mercy when all is right with the world. It is much, much more difficult to remain in community and communion when the seams of our lives begin to split open.

Joel calls us in the midst of tragedy and sorrow to return to God—return to the Holy—return to life's very foundation. When we gather as

God's children to sing and dance, confess and cry, pray and ponder, we are repenting—literally turning our lives around. We gather as a community each week to confess our brokenness, that we might turn our faces toward God's open arms of loving acceptance.

When Joel tells us to tear not our garments, but to rend our hearts, we are once again being stretched beyond the life-boxes we have created for ourselves. In Joel's day—whichever century that might be!—the heart was seen as the seat of the intellect. In other words, repentance is more than feeling sorrow and feeling sorry for ourselves. It is more than feeling bad for the brokenness in our lives. When we rend our hearts, we are fully engaging our intellect AND our emotions—our heart and our mind as we turn back to God. It is as if God wants us to repent—to turn back to the Holy—not because we are riddled with guilty feelings, but because we KNOW we need God's steadfast mercy and love to shape our days.

Joel expands on this in great detail. When we turn back to God willingly, it becomes an act of heart and mind because we experience God's very nature. God, Joel tells us, is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounds in steadfast love.

Now, how awesome is that?? God's graciousness means complete and total goodwill for all his people. God wills **not** tragedy, but goodness for our lives. God's mercy translates from the Hebrew as the love a mother has for her child. In other words, God loves us as a mother loves her child—unconditionally. It is in God's nature to be slow to anger. Yahweh is not hot-tempered like some red-heads I could name. Oh no! God' patiently waits for us to return—that we might know God's covenantal, relational, communal love that God has made with us forever and ever.

Imagine how these words of hope and promise might have been heard by the tax collector who went to the Temple to pray in today's New Testament parable. Unlike the self-righteous Pharisee, he knew his sin and brokenness and claimed it as his own. Then, the tax collector took the next step—he offered that brokenness to God: the Holy One who is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love.

It is the same for each of us. When we choose to turn our lives back to God—through worship and prayer, through service and mission, through giving and living—we will know fully God's mercy and grace.


Even in the midst of the plagues that rain upon us, God is still the Lord—loving us, forgiving us, calling us his beloved children today and forevermore. Amen.


