CODE OF CONDUCT

The Board of Management and the Challenge Committee of The Man From Snowy River Challenge recognises the importance of conducting a competition that reflects integrity, sportsmanlike behaviour and sound animal welfare protocols.

Riders and/or their associates using any medium including electronic technology to defame either The Man From Snowy River Challenge, its Judges, Officials or Volunteers, will be referred to the Disciplinary Committee

This Code is intended to compliment and support existing Challenge rules.

COMPETITORS SHALL:

- Enter this competition in a fair and friendly manner with respect for fellow competitors and Festival organisers
- Accept the program, rules and requirements as set out by the 2. Committee within the MFSR Challenge Rulebook
- Agree to abide by the rules and conditions set out in this rule 3. book and accept the Judges' and the Vets' decisions as final
- 4. In the event of a dispute the following process must be followed:
 - First discuss with the relevant Event Manager
 - Judge MUST NOT BE approached by competitor
- 5. Failure to abide by the above may affect future participation.

LIVESTOCK

The staging of this competition and the conduct of those involved are subject to the relevant animal welfare requirements of the State of Victoria. Any animal deemed as unfit by the veterinarians will not be permitted to continue in the competition. All veterinary decisions made will be accepted as final.

Mistreatment or unnecessary roughness to any animal during the festival will not be tolerated and will be referred for adjudication by the Challenge and/or disciplinary committee.

It is to be noted that all rough stock used in this competition is provided by an accredited stock provider. All horses and other livestock are always handled and transported by experienced stockmen/women. Veterinary advice and support are provided by local vet's pre-event and during the competition. A vet is always on site

MFSR CHALLENGE OVERVIEW

The Man From Snowy River Challenge commences on Thursday from 11.00am, with registration and compulsory vet and gear check at the Challenge office adjacent to the campdraft arena. Riders compete in six preliminary events and the top 10 Open finalists, 5 Ladies finalists, 5 Junior finalists and 5 Striplings finalists will vie for their respective titles on Sunday. The same horse, stockwhip, saddle and headgear must be used throughout the competition.

RM Williams Australian Stockmans Award for Vet and Gear Check: THURSDAY

This event ensures the spirit and high standard of competition is maintained and that competitors' horses are sufficiently fit, trained and presented. It is compulsory for all Challenge competitors to meet the criteria for this event before continuing in the competition.

The Six Preliminary Events:

- 1. Anvil Enterprises Australia & Milong Angus Stud Packhorse
- 2. Cydectin Platinum Stockhandling
- 3. JC Milton Jimmy Scammell Horseshoeing
- 4. Southern Mountain Helicopter's Bareback
- 5. 4cvte Cattlemen's Crack
- 6. S & K Whitehead Earthmoving Stockmen's Cut Out

OPEN FINAL - SUNDAY

CRT AgMate Wild Horse Catch: 10 Finalists attempt to halter a horse in an arena within 2 minutes and demonstrate young horse handling skills and horsemanship.

All Thing Country Kosciusko Stocksaddle Buckjump: Using the same stock saddle and gear used throughout the competition, finalists attempt to retain their seat on a bucking horse for 8 seconds.

LADIES FINAL - SUNDAY

CRT AgMate Ladies Silver Brumby Catch: 5 Finalists attempt to halter a horse in an arena within 2 minutes and demonstrate young horse handling skills and horsemanship.

JUNIOR FINAL - SUNDAY

5 Junior finalists attempt to highlight their skills and ability negotiating either a set working pattern or obstacle course.

STIRIPLINGS FINAL - SUNDAY

5 striplings finalists attempt to highlight their skills and ability negotiating a set working pattern.

The Man from Snowy River Challenge Committee aims to run a professional and challenging competition appropriate to the high standard of horsemanship immortalised in the telling of the 'The Man from Snowy River' poem. The following Rules and Conditions should be read by all competitors prior to submitting their entry forms and adhered to throughout the competition.

- Competitors must be experienced, proven and accomplished riders with appropriately trained and fit horses capable of undertaking the rugged and trying conditions of competitive riding.
- Senior competitors must be 18 years of age and over. Junior competitors must be aged 14 years of age and under 18 years and Striplings 10 years of age and under 14 years on the first day of competition. Junior and Stripling competitors must have parental or legal guardian consent to participate in the Challenge. Proof of Junior Age is required at time of entry (copy of birth certificate)
- The Man From Snowy River Challenge will be limited to 80 competitors. If entries exceed the limit, the Challenge Committee will have the final decision on the competitor list. There will be a percentage breakdown on open, ladies and Juniors.
- 4. Each Competitor is allowed one and the same horse for the entire competition unless the Committee allows a substitute horse on the Vets' advice prior to the commencement of the Challenge.
- In the event of lameness/injury the horse will be subject to a fitness check by the Vet on duty before being permitted to continue. This includes the Cross Country event.
- The Judges' decision on whether a competitor and/or his/ her horse are sufficiently fit and skilled to compete in the competition is final and no discussion will be entered into.
- 7. Entries will be accepted online. All fully completed applications received in this time will be considered. Riders will be notified of their acceptance in writing. Any riders put on a waiting list will also be notified. Payment is not required until riders have been confirmed.

- 8. All competitors must provide evidence of their current Ambulance Cover. A photocopy of their policy must be submitted with their entry. Entries will not be accepted until this evidence is provided.
- 9. All competitors who enter agree to do so on the condition that they will compete and ride in the manner and spirit recognised as fitting to the theme and image of the Australian horsemen
- 10. All competitors who enter do so with the intent of riding in the final events if they progress forward into the Top Ten Open, Top Five Ladies, Top Five Juniors, or Top Five Striplings.
- 11. All competitors enter at their own risk with no responsibility accepted by the Committee for loss or injury to riders. livestock, or property.
- 12. Competitor MUST not approach a judge all inquiries must go through event manager.
- 13. All decisions made by the Judges, Vets or Committee are final and discussion will not be entered into. If competitor continues to argue they will receive their first and final warning and may lose all points for that section.
- 14. Any person found interfering with, impeding or damaging stock, gear or event equipment or interfering with or impeding the judging, scoring or other competitors at any time will be subject to disqualification by the Committee.
- 15. The Committee reserves the right to alter any event at any time to ensure the safety of competitors, their horses, and the public.
- 16. All Challenge event venues are closed to competitors 6 weeks prior to Festival week. Contravention of this condition will result in the forfeit by that competitor of their right to compete.
- 17. Cancellations: refunds (less 15% administration fee) will only be given at the discretion of the Challenge Committee. Cancellations must be accompanied by a Vet's or Doctor's certificate

- 18. Stallions will be allowed to be unrestrained in panel yards through daylight hours only. Only one horse is allowed per enclosure. Stallions must be double tied at night. Panels must be a minimum of 1500mm in height and constructed using an equivalent of 4 bars of 25mm box or pipe equivalent as a minimum. Panels must be anchored securely to a solid object (e.g., truck, post). Trees must be protected from damage of any kind i.e., horses chewing bark / ringbarking
- 19. Competitors must wear their MFSRBF Challenge competitor wristband throughout the event.
- 20. All Juniors must always wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet whilst mounted. Current approved safety standards include, AS/NZS 3838, ARB HS 2012, ASTM F1163, PAS 015, SNELL E2001 and VGL
- 21. All other riders are advised to always wear Equestrian Australia approved helmets whilst mounted. Current approved safety standards are outlined in point 19.
- 22. If an Open/Lady rider chooses not to wear an approved safety helmet throughout the event or chooses to ride without a bridle in the Bareback Obstacle they do so at their own risk and at no responsibility to the Challenge Committee and Festival Board
- 23. Competitors are to always wear their competition bibs when competing or when walking/riding a course.
- 24. All Competitors and their horses must be able to jump 1m confidently.
- 25. All Competitors must use a leather stockwhip throughout the competition.
- 26. The Committee reserves the right to remove any rider and/ or their support member/s from the Festival grounds at any stage during the event that display anti-social behavior and/ or are under the influence of illicit substance or alcohol.
- 27. By entering the event competitors agree to accept and abide by the MFSRBF Challenge Code of Conduct and Conditions of Entry. They further agree to accept the ruling of judges and/or officials as final.

BEHAVIOUR

- 28. You must ensure that You and Your invitees act in an orderly manner when attending the Event or in Campsites. We may refuse entry or evict you or any of your invitees if they are behaving in a disorderly, offensive, threatening or inappropriate manner towards any person.
- 29. Any person behaving in a drunken, disorderly manner that causes disruption or danger to any other person or property within the Festival grounds. Golf Course, or Competitor Camping areas are subject to removal from the Grounds.
- 30. The organisers may refuse you entry into, or remove you from the festival if you:
 - refuse to allow the Officials or their representatives to inspect bags, containers and vehicles at the festival
 - fail to follow instructions from a Festival Official disrupt the festival in any way or campers attending the Festival.
 - interfere with the enjoyment, comfort or safety of other persons at the festival.
 - have acquired a stolen or counterfeit ticket.
 - are an under-age drinker
 - do not obey the terms and conditions as noted in this document.
 - or if the organisers suspect you of any of the above.
- 31 Directions of MESRBE Officials: You must follow the reasonable directions of MFSRBF Officials and comply with the law at all times during the event.

CHALLENGE RULES

- The Challenge events will be run over four days (including Vet and Gear check on Thursday).
- Scores awarded in the Vet and Gear check will NOT form part of the aggregate tally used to determine the winners of either the Man From Snowy River or the Lady or Junior Man From Snowy River titles.
- All competitors will contest six preliminary events: Stock Handling, Whip Crack/Cross Country, Packsaddle, Bareback Obstacle, Stockmen's Cut Out and Horseshoeing
- 4. The Top Ten Open riders compete in two final events: Brumby Catch and Stocksaddle Buckjump.
 - The Top Five Lady riders compete in one final event: the Wild Horse Catch.
 - The Top Five Junior and Striplings riders compete in one final event
- Each of the events will be judged individually. An aggregate point tally from each event contested including finals (except the Vet and Gear check) will determine the winners.
- 6. On acceptance of entry, riders agree to compete in all preliminary events.
- All competitors must attempt to complete the program as determined by the Challenge Committee and set out in the Challenge Rule Book.
- 8. Thursday all course are able to be walked through by competitors. Course maps and other relevant information will be provided at registration on Thursday and displayed on the notice board at the Challenge Office from Thursday evening. Thursday evening brief will allow competitors to ask questions of the event managers.
- Scores awarded in each event will be posted straight after event for 10 minutes then signed off and sent to office. At the end of each day all scores will be posted.

CHALLENGE RULES

- 10. In the event of a fall, competitors must exit the course. They will only be scored up to that point
- Finalists will be announced on Saturday evening at the 11. Rodeo Arena. Please note the Finalist rules and conditions.
- 12. Presentation of preliminary awards will take place on Sunday. All competitors are required for this presentation and should be mounted, turned out in proper attire and gear to gain entry to the arena. Absence at the presentations, without prior consultation with the Events Coordinator, will result in loss of prizes, prize money and may affect your chance to compete next year.
- 13. Prizes will be awarded for the top scorer in each individual event in the Open, Ladies and Junior Challenges, overall Highest Scoring Veteran Rider (50yrs old and over), the Highest Scoring Rookie horse (Open horse first year of competing in the MFSR Challenge), the Highest Scoring Stock Horse in the Open, Lady and Junior categories, the Highest Scoring Novice Rider in both the Open and Ladies Challenge (neither horse nor rider is to have finalled at The Man From Snowy River) and the Best Sportsman's Award.
- 14. Scores awarded for Brumby Catch, Stocksaddle Buckjump, the Ladies Brumby Catch and Junior Final will not be included in the calculation for these other awards
- 15. In the Final presentation, the Open Challenge prizes will be awarded for 1st to 10th, Lady Challenge prizes will be awarded 1st to 5th. Junior and Striplings Challenge prizes will be awarded 1st to 5th.
- 16. In the event of a tie in the final score, the Committee will split the prize money and the competitors will toss for the sash
- 17. Any changes to your entry details must be in writing to the Challenge Coordinator (email or hand written accepted).

1. VET AND GEAR CHECK

Competition Arena: Campdraft Arena Thursday - 1pm to 4pm

Briefing: Competitors allotted time for this event will be advised at registration. The Judge/s have the right to call on any competitor to inspect their attire and gear. If found to be unsafe or illegal, the competitor is compelled to remove or change the offending article before competing.

Bring ALL items of gear to check (if in doubt bring it!)

If competitors fail to comply with the essential requirements of this event, they will not qualify to compete in the Challenge events.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Competitor MUST walk horse to marshalling area
- Competitors must present in clothing appropriate to an Australian Stockman/ woman with all gear required for each event (except shoeing tools). Neat, clean presentation of the horse and rider is expected demonstrating due respect to the Judges, Event Managers and the Event.
- Equestrian Australia approved helmet. Approved helmet numbers include AS/NZS 3838, ARB HS 2012, ASTM F1163, PAS 015, SNELL E2001 and VGI
- 4. A full-length oilskin coat and leather stockwhip must be carried on the horse throughout all events. Exceptions to this are:
 - The Wild Horse Catch Stockwhip and oilskin coat are not required
 - The Stock Saddle Buckjump Stockwhip and oilskin coat are not required
 - Bareback Saddle and oilskin coat are not required

JUDGING CRITERIA: HORSE GEAR (30 POINTS)

- 1. Present to the Judges with all gear correctly fitted to the horse
- 2. All gear must be in a clean and safe. If deemed by the judges not to comply, gear must be fixed/replaced and re-presented to the Judges within 30 minutes.
- 3. The following gear is essential:
 - Saddles must be well fitted and well maintained.
 - Saddle pads/cloths must be clean and well fitted
 - A correctly fitted bridle and bit with appropriate safe reins are required

1. VET AND GEAR CHECK

4. The following gear is optional:

- A correctly fitted running martingale is permitted for the cross country only
- Breastplate, surcingle and crupper are optional
- The use of horse leg protection is optional
- Spurs are optional

5. The following gear is NOT permitted:

- Twisted mouthpiece bits are NOT permitted
- Tie downs are NOT permitted
- Saddles with horns are NOT permitted
- 6. All gear presented in this event will be noted and photographed.

JUDGING CRITERIA: FITNESS CHECK & SOUNDNESS (40 POINTS)

- Please present the horse to the Vet unsaddled.
- 8 The Vet will assess the horses standing heart rate
- 9. Vets will assess soundness (i.e. not lame, girth galled, saddle sore etc). The horse must be able to lead at a trot to the satisfaction of the Vet
- 10. If a horse is vetted out, the competitor may present a spare horse to the Vet within 30 minutes.

The same horse must be used throughout the competition. A MFSRBF identification mark will be put on each competitor's horse and a photo taken by an official.

Top 10 finalists may be subject to gear check prior to competing in the Finals

Competitors must present at the Rodeo Arena on Sunday for presentations in proper attire and gear to gain entry to the arena for official presentations.

Scores awarded in the Vet and Gear Check will NOT form part of the aggregate tally used to determine the winners of either the Man From Snowy River or the Lady or Junior Man From Snowy River titles

RM WILLIAMS AUSTRALIAN STOCKMAN'S HERITAGE AWARD

This is a stand-alone event. This event will be judged in conjunction with Vet and Gear Check.

No challenge points are accrued from this event; however, we encourage competitors to adopt the high standard of presentation exemplified by the legendary RM Williams.

The horse and rider must be presented in the Australian Stock Horse style.

JUDGING CRITERIA:

Please note that this is assessed on appropriateness to an Australian Stockman/ woman in the theme of "The Man From Snowy River".

- A full-length oilskin coat and leather stockwhip must be carried on the horse
- Horse will be fully saddled for this event

GENERAL PRESENTATION

Presentation of horse as follows:

- 1. The horse, at the very least, should be clean.
- 2. The horse should be neatly presented.
- 3. Protective leg gear permitted.

Presentation of tack as follows:

- Tack does not have to be new or extremely expensive. Older tack, well cared for, usually looks and fits better.
- Ensure that the tack is correctly fitted and does not rub or disturb the horse.
- 6 Make sure the tack used is suitable for the event

1. VET AND GEAR CHECK

Presentation of the Rider as follows:

- Collared shirt with long sleeves
- 8. Neat Stockman's cut trousers (like moleskins) or jeans
- 9 Appropriate Australian style felt hat
- 10. Appropriate smooth soled riding boots
- 11. The handler or rider who conveys a neat, workmanlike impression will score higher in the Judge's initial mental assessment than that of a less tidy or flamboyant combination.
- 12. Jewellery is out of place and can be dangerous. If you must wear earrings, the tiniest of plain, discreet studs only are suitable.
- 13. The rider should have neat and tidy hair.

2. ANVIL ENTERPRISES & MILONG ANGUS STUD PACKHORSE

Event Manager: Caren Maxwell

Competition Arena: Pack Horse Arena

Briefing:

- Open section will be required to shoe a horse with packing
 will have different set course.
- Ladies and Juniors will have a different course and pack to complete.
- Packsaddles will be supplied by the Challenge Committee.
- Equipment to be packed will be stipulated and supplied by the Challenge Committee.
- Stewards will oversee each competitor during packing and unpacking.
- Please note that if you run out of time on course you are required to stop at that point and excited the course you will only be scored up to that point.
- If you ride past and obstacle you will receive and automatic navigate time bonus of -5 points.

SECTION ONE (50 POINTS) - SEE SHOEING RULES

- Open Competitors to fit one front shoe and pack horse (in any order) in set time.
- Competitor to supply their own horse & shoeing horse does not need to be competition horse (horse can be used for packing and shoeing).
- Only 3 shoeing tools of competitors choice are allowed in the shoeing area – committee will supply an anvil, shaping hammer, shoes and nails. Your shoeing chaps and knife are not included in the 3 tools.
- Ladies and Juniors are not required to shoe a horse in this section.

2. ANVIL ENTERPRISES & MILONG ANGUS STUD PACKHORSE

SECTION TWO (50 POINTS)

- Competitors to complete one circuit of the course then start on obstacles (map provided at briefing)
- 1 attempt allowed at each obstacle after 1 attempt they MUST move on to next obstacle.
- Event will have set time (disclosed at briefing)
- Time will end at the end of section 2

SECTION THREE (40 POINTS)

- Competitors to return to unpacking area judge will check pack and remove pack surcingle first.
- Then competitor to remove top pack and bags once given all clear from the judge.
- The judge will then finish unsaddling.

Section two points:	50
Section three points:	40
Time Bonus:	10

Briefing: Thursday afternoon at the competitor briefing, Competitors will be briefed on judging criteria.

REQUIREMENTS

- Shoes, nails, shaping hammer and anvils will be supplied by the Challenge Committee.
- Competitors to supply all other shoeing gear. Open can only 3 tools of their choice - Apron and Knife are not included in the three tools and are permitted.
- Competitors are required to provide their own horse for shoeing. Competitors must ensure that the horse is sound to be shod. No stand-by horses will be available.
- 4. Only one horse handler is permitted entry into the horse shoeing arena with any one competitor.
- 5. Coaching and/or handing tools by a handler or spectator during the event is strictly prohibited.

Requirements - Open Competitors to fit one front shoe and pack horse (in any order) in set time.

- Competitors are to demonstrate their ability to prepare and apply a shoe to one front foot
- Competitor to supply their own horse & shoeing horse does not need to be competition horse (horse can be used for packing and shoeing).
- Only 3 shoeing tools of competitors choice are allowed in the shoeing area - committee will supply an anvil, shaping hammer shoes and nails
- Horses foot can be prep prior to entering the competition - There is no requirement for minimum hoof growth, hoof can be prepared.

4. JC MILTON JIMMY SCAMMELL **HORSESHOEING**

REQUIREMENTS - LADIES

- Competitors are to demonstrate their ability to prepare and shoe one front foot, within a time limit of 15 mins
- No tool limit
- Horse' foot must have at least 4 weeks growth

5. BAREBACK OBSTACLE

Competition Arena: Bareback Arena

Events Manager: Lincoln Knight

Briefing:Competitors must walk the course on Thursday TBA course map will be in the competitor pack collected at registration between 11.00am and 3.00pm Thursday.

Prior to competing, competitors will be informed what is required of them at each obstacle and in the freestyle by the judges.

REQUIREMENTS

Competitors are to complete an obstacle course within a set time and a compulsory 60 second freestyle component.

- 1. Competitors are required to carry a stock whip in hand throughout the course.
- 2. Open riders may demonstrate quality horsemanship by using either no headgear, neck rope, halter, or a bridle in this event. Riders will be marked down for poor use of selected headgear as part of 'balance, control and standard of horsemanship of rider and training of horse' score.
- 3. 60 seconds of freestyle designed to demonstrate horsemanship, control and skill is to be undertaken following completion of the obstacle course. Simple props will be allowed dogs included. Any competitors considering this option must speak with event coordinator prior to competition. This will then be considered by the Event Manager and Judges, approval/denial notification will be given in writing.
- 4 Props are to be on and off the arena in the 60 seconds of freestyle time. Any form of livestock is NOT to be used as a prop. Please take note: Any freestyle that is deemed dangerous will be stopped by the judges resulting in a zero score.
- 5 PROPS MUST BE ON HAND READY TO GO - NO WAITING WILL BE TOLERATED NO BLIND FOLDING OF THE HORSE OR EXCESSIVE HAIR PULLING ON HORSE.
- 6. Each competitor will be timed, and a whistle will mark the end of the set time for both the obstacle course and again for the freestyle component. Once final time has been called on the

5 BAREBACK OBSTACLE

- obstacle course the competitor must move to designated freestyle area and be ready to start on the judges' signal. No time penalties and no score allocated for any obstacles completed after time.
- 7. In the event of a tie for first place, the fastest time will determine the winner.
- 8. Both start and finish lines must be crossed the latter only if the course has been completed within the set time.
- Junior Competitors MUST complete the set course using a bridle but can use their own choice of bridle or halter in their 60 second freestyle.
- 10. ALL Competitors MUST always ride within their limitations with the emphasis being on safety. If Judge deems the rider to be unsafe or at risk of harming horse, rider, or volunteers, they will be asked to stop and leave the arena.

JUDGING CRITERIA

- Two attempts are allowed at each obstacle. Second attempt, max 1 point.
- 12. Horse and rider will be scored on the quality of negotiation of obstacles with each obstacle to be executed within the prescribed boundary and scored by course judge.
- 13. If at any time rider drops their stock whip, they must retrieve it before continuing with no deductions. If a rider DOES NOT retrieve their stock whip and continues, an error of course will be given at each attempted obstacle thereafter.
- In the event of equal top points, the winner will be decided on a count back on time. The fastest time wins.
- 15. Riders demonstrating poor control will be marked down.
- Course time will be set, and riders advised at time of walking the course.
- 17. If a competitor falls off their horse, they will not score from this point onwards and must leave the course.

REQUIREMENTS

Whip to be carried for duration of the run.

The Stockman's Cutout section consists of three sections:

- Boxing: at the start of the run, a competitor will receive a single cow into the arena. Competitors will then proceed to demonstrate their ability to hold their cow on the prescribed end of the arena for a sufficient time to demonstrate the ability of their horse to contain the cow at that end.
- Fence Turns: at the completion of the boxing, competitors will run their cow down either long side of the fence. The competitor must turn the cow one way in each direction (one turn to the left and one to the right).
- 3. **Circles**: Upon completing the two fence turns, the competitor will take their cow to an open part of the arena, (the closer to the centre the better) and circle the cow both directions (one circle to the left and one to the right, in either order).

These three sections must be completed in order.

Each section is scored individually, along with an overall horsemanship score awarded.

1 whistle can also signal to the competitor that the judges have seen enough.

In both instances, competitors are asked to stop working their beast and exit the arena

2 whistles blown during a run, signals to the competitor that the judges have deemed the cow drawn as unreasonably difficult or unworkable and have awarded a new cow. The competitor must stop working the current cow and wait for it to be removed from the arena and a new cow be let into the arena. Competitors can stand still or walk in a small circle. They must not train on their horse during this time- no backing up, flexing, etc.

All competitors are reminded that the welfare of the stock is a priority and due care and respect must be demonstrated throughout your run.

Rules subject to change by judges or event manager as deemed necessary.

7. 4CYTE CATTLEMEN'S CRACK

Event Manager: Jake Faithfull

Competition Arena: Reserve Paddock

Briefing: The course will consist of various whipcrack targets and jumps/obstacles.

A map of the course will be included the Competitors Pack. Competitors must walk the course at their own leisure on the Thursday before the competition starts. Helmets are advised to be worn but are not compulsory for 18years and over. Competitors must ride in competition saddle. If a competitor falls off their horse they must exit the course. They will be scored up to that point but will incur a 50 point time penalty. If you lose your whip during the course you must stop and retrieve. If there is any equipment failure you must stop and safely exit the course.

A final course briefing will take place at the camp draft shed on Thursday night.

REQUIREMENTS

Section One: Obstacle Course

- The course is to be completed within an optimum time; points will be deducted accordingly as outlined below. The metres/ minute according to optimum time will be set depending on the conditions and will be advised prior to
- 2. All jumps will be numbered and must be ridden between the flags with red on the right and white on the left.
- Riders are not permitted to wear a stopwatch or timing device whilst competing.
- Mounted stewards will be on course to assist as directed by Events Manager
- 5. Competitors may choose to ride around or not attempt a jump and will not incur any penalty points for doing so.
- If first attempt is unsuccessful/refusal occurs, then competitors may attempt again without penalty to educate their horse however will not be awarded points for that obstacle.
- If there is any equipment failure, the competitor may continue to ride the course if it is safe to do so and must make the steward/events manager aware at completion of the course.

7. 4CYTE CATTLEMEN'S CRACK

- Any jumps or obstacles completed out of order will not be 8. scored.
- 9. The jump judges/stewards may stop any competitor in the event of an emergency. If a competitor is stopped on course, their 'down-time' will be recorded and subtracted from their total time on course.
- 10. In the event of a tie for first place, the competitor who completes the course closest to the optimum time and with most amount of obstacles successfully completed will be declared the winner
- 11. Failure to cross the designated start/finish line will result in a 25-point deduction.

- Any Open rider who chooses not to participate in either the Wild Horse Catch or the Buckjump will be required to forfeit their Top Ten status. In the event of a rider withdrawing from the Top Ten the rider qualifying as number eleven will be notified of their elevation into the Top Ten.
- 3. Any Lady rider who chooses not to participate in the Wild Horse Catc will be required to forfeit her Top Five status. In the event of a Lady rider withdrawing from the Top Five, the rider qualifying as number six will be notified of her elevation into the Top Five.
- 4. Any Junior rider who chooses not to participate in the Junior Final will be required to forfeit their Top Five status. In the event of a Junior rider withdrawing from the Top Five, the rider qualifying as number Six will be notified of their elevation into the Top Five.
- Any rider who chooses not to participate in the final events will forfeit all prize money and will affect future inclusion in the event at the Committee's discretion.

Draws for the Challenge Finals will be held on the morning of Sunday starting at 9.30am at the Challenge Office. Bucking horses will be numbered prior to the draw.

FINALS RULES

Ladies Final (TOP 5) - Ladies Silver Brumby Catc

Top Five Lady riders go forward to compete in one final event, the Brumby Catch.

Finalists attempt to halter a horse in an arena within 2 minutes.

Please refer to the rules and judging criteria for Brumby Catch. The Ladies final will follow the same rules and criteria.

The Lady Champion will be the competitor with the highest aggregate score over the 3 days of competition

Junior Final (TOP 5) - Jack Riley Junior Final

The Top Five Junior Finalists attempt to highlight their skills and ability negotiating a set working pattern/obstacle course. Pattern will be available at Rider Registration on Thursday between 12pm and 3pm.

The winner of the Junior Final will be the competitor with the highest score.

The Junior Champion will be the competitor with the highest aggregate score over the 3 days of competition.

8. CRT AGMATE WILD HORSE

Competition Arena: Rodeo Arena

Event Mangers: Jayden Pierce

Briefing: The 10 highest scoring open riders and the 5 highest scoring lady riders qualify to compete in this event.

There will be a position draw for each rider at 9.30am on Sunday. All finalists must bring their halter to the draw for inspection by the Event Manager and Judges.

Competitors can wear one glove if they so wish. Oilskin coats and whips are not required.

Competitors are not permitted any helpers.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Competitors must assemble at the Rodeo yards.
- 2. Only halters with a blocker on shank can be used.
- Judges will inspect halters prior to the event and any halter found to be unsafe will be replaced with a stand-by halter provided by judges.
- A Competitor will enter the Arena and await the release of the horse
- A horse will be turned loose in the arena from the bucking chutes.
- The competitor's time will begin when the horse clears the chute
- 7. A total of **three** minutes is allowed to catch and handle the brumby. A whistle is blown after one minute, two minutes and three minutes.
- Competitors must catch and correctly fit their halter to the horse within two minutes. Should a competitor not catch and have their halter correctly fitted at the two-minute mark, they will receive no points for the event

8. CRT AGMATE WILD HORSE

9. Once a competitor catches and correctly fits the halter on the Wild Horse, they have the remaining time to demonstrate young horse handling skills and horsemanship to the judges. Judging ends at three minutes or when the competitor signals to the Judge that he/she has finished.

Disqualification - Competitors will be automatically disqualified if:

- 10. There is any deliberate dragging or mishandling of the horse.
- 11. Competitor loses riding horse.
- 12. Competitor attaches any part of the lead rope to themselves or competition horse or any part thereof.
- 13. Riding horse places leg over any part of halter/lead rope.
- 14. Rider will be disqualified at any point by the judges if they are riding dangerously, putting themselves or horse at risk of injury, they will be cracked off and required to stop immediately and exit arena.

Briefing: Bucking horses will be drawn at 9.00am on Sunday morning at the Challenge office. The Event Manager and judges will conduct the draw.

Competitors are to be at the marshalling area at 1.45pm on Sunday. Three calls only will be given and in the event a competitor is not present; the Event Manager can disqualify that competitor.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Width of Halter nose band must not be wider than 4 inches
- 2. Competitors must use the same stock saddle they have used for all the previous events.
- 3. Either Crupper or Back girth to be used. Back girth must not be wider than 2.5 inches.
- 4. Width of front girth must be at least 4 inches.
- 5. Nothing may be carried on the saddle forward of the kneepad.
- 6. Competitors must try to retain their seat for 8 seconds.
- 7. Any grab down will result in automatic disqualification.
- 8. Spurs must comply with rodeo specifications (i.e. blunt loose running spurs, no dummy spurs or side rowels).
- Competitors (or the contractor supplying the bucking horses) have the right to confer with the judges to ensure that the horse is saddled and flanked correctly.
- 10. Competitors are permitted one helper only at the chutes.
- Competitors must leave the chutes with both hands clear of the horse.
- 12. In the event of a tie Competitors have the option of a ride off or toss a coin to determine the winner

9. ALL THINGS COUNTRY STOCKSADDLE BUCKJUMP

Penalties

Any deliberate time wasting, over tightening of the girth or other attempt to stop the horse from bucking will result in a maximum penalty of 40 points. This includes excessive mane pulling, too short a bucking rein and incorrectly fitted head collar.

TOM GROGGIN STRIPLINGS CHALLENGE

Welcome to The Man From Snowy River Striplings Challenge. Our Challenge Committee and Board of Management are dedicated to the encouragement and training of the future "Men and Women" From Snowy River champions. We have built a Challenge which offers young riders a unique opportunity to compete in a variety of events designed to highlight the heritage of the Australian Bush. These events encourage young riders to strive to learn the skills of their forebears and continue the legend of The Man From Snowy River.

Striplings Overview

The Man From Snowy River Striplings Challenge commences with a compulsory Gear Check for all competitors on Thursday Competitors compete in five events followed by a final challenge on Sunday for the top five competitors. The preliminary events consist of the Cattlemen's Jump, Whip Crack, Packhorse and Dry Work Pattern and Bareback Obstacle.

We will have a Mini Striplings (10 & 11) and Stripling's section (12 & 13) only striplings will compete in the final event, mini striplings will be awards prizes on their overall placing.

Conditions of entry

All conditions of entry including code of conduct and competitor registration and camping guidelines in this rule book apply to Striplings and their associates unless otherwise stated in the following rules and regulations for the Striplings event.

- Stripling competitors must be aged 10 years and under 14 years on the first day of competition. Proof of age is required (copy of birth certificate).
- The Man from Snowy River Striplings Challenge is limited to 25 competitors. Five places will be held for the previous year's Top Five. All other entries received will be reviewed with the challenge committee selecting the final 25 competitors based on competition experience.
- Entries will be accepted online. Only fully completed entries will be accepted. Riders will be notified of their acceptance.
 Any rider put on a waiting list will also be notified accordingly.
 Payment is not required until riders have been confirmed.

TOM GROGGIN STRIPLINGS **CHALLENGE**

- Parents/guardians are responsible for their Stripling Competitor until they enter each separate competition area.
- 5. No stallions permitted, competition horses must be aged 3 years or older
- 6 All riders must always wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet whilst mounted. Approved helmets include, AS/NZS 3838, ARB HS 2012, ASTM F1163, SNELL E2001, PAS 015 and VGI
- 7. All Competitors must be able to confidently jump up to and including 70cm.
- 8. Competitors must follow the instructions of the judge and stewards at all times.

STRIPLINGS CHALLENGE RULES

- The Striplings Challenge will run from 7.30am to 5.30pm Friday, Saturday & final Sunday.
- All competitors must register Campdraft shed and present at 2. Campdraft Arena Thursday - 1.00pm - 4.00pm for vet and gear check.
- 3. Following registration, there will be a riders' briefing. All competitors must attend the riders' briefing, as it will include last minute instructions and will allow the opportunity for any questions to answered.
- Stripling competitors will compete in five individual events, 4. being Cattleman's Jump, Bareback Obstacle, dry work pattern, Whipcrack, Packhorse.
- Having entered, all competitors must attempt to complete the program as determined by the Challenge Committee as set out in this Rule Book
- 6 The Top Five Finalists will be announced Saturday.
- 7. The Final will take place on Sunday Morning in Main Arena Finals will be a wet work pattern.
- Presentation of competitors and awards will be advised at debrie. All riders are required to be at the marshalling area on the Stock Route, 15 minutes prior to presentations and must be mounted and wearing their competition bib.
- 9. Prizes will be awarded for the high point score for the mini stripling's 1st-3rd.

- 10. Prizes will be awarded to the Top Five Finalists from 1st to 5th
- 11. If a competitor comes their horse for any reason during the event, they must stop and exit the course and will only be scored to that point.
- 12. Bareback Obstacle course freestyle section must have props approved one week prior to competition to the Event manger Brooke Arnold: brookesharane@gmail.com.

VET AND GEAR CHECK THURSDAY 1PM - 4PM

Vet and Gear Check for competitors and horses will take place promptly from 1-4pm Thursday at the Campdraft.

Competitors are required to carry a full length, working leather stockwhip throughout each event and must have a full-length oilskin coat attached to the back of their saddle throughout each event.

STRIPLINGS CATTLEMEN'S JUMP

Competition Arena: Cross country course

Briefing: A briefing and course walk will take place. Competitors will be mounted for the course walk BUT are not permitted to attempt any jump or obstacle during this time. Any competitor observed doing so, will be eliminated from this event.

- The jump course will include 10 jumps/obstacles. Of these jumps, 10 will be worth 8 points each and 1 bonus obstacle will be worth 20 points with a total of 100 points achievable.
- 5 BONUS POINTS will be awarded to the competitor with the highest points and the closest time recorded to the optimum time.
- The jumps will be no more than 70cm in height and may include water, ditches, logs, tyres, and hay bales. They will be marked with numbers 1-10 including cones.
- To ensure the safety of competitors and horses, an optimum time will be set
- Mounted stewards will be on course to assist as directed by the Event Manager.
- A map of the course will be included in the Competitors' Pack distributed at registration.

Rules

- 1. Competitors and horses MUST be capable of jumping up to 70cm and travelling through ditches and water confidently and safelv.
- 2. ONE attempt at each jump. If the horse stops and steps backwards or to the side, this is classed as a refusal. You will be asked to move on and no points will be awarded for that jump.
- 3. All competitors must always wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet whilst mounted.
- Should a horse and/or competitor fall whilst competing, they 4. will not be permitted to continue. They will retain all Cattleman's Jump points accrued prior to the fall.
- Competitors must carry a full-length oilskin coat and a 5. stockwhip and ride in the saddle they will use throughout the entire competition.
- 6. Competitors may ride around or not attempt a jump. They will not score any points for that jump.
- 7 Any jumps taken out of order will not be scored.
- 8. An optimum time will be disclosed at debrief.
- Competitors finishing more than 20 seconds under the optimum time will incur a 5-point penalty.
- 10. For safety reasons, any dangerous or excessively fast riding will not be allowed during this event.
- 11. No competitor is to attempt the cross-country course after completion of the event during the Festival weekend.

Briefing: A briefing and course walk will take place prior to each group commencing.

Rules

All competitors must always wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet whilst mounted. The course will comprise of 10 obstacles and must be completed within a set time.

- There will be 60 seconds of freestyle work at the completion of 2. the obstacle course.
- 3. Horse and rider will be scored on the quality of negotiation of obstacles with each obstacle to be executed within the prescribed boundary and scored by the course judge.
- Two attempts will be allowed at each obstacle. A maximum of 8 points can be scored on the first attempt and a maximum of 4 points can be scored on the second attempt. If the second attempt is unsuccessful, the competitor will be asked to move on, and zero points will be scored for that obstacle.
- Competitors MUST always ride within their limitations with the 5 emphasis on safety.
- 6. Competitors MUST NOT remove their horse's bridle during the freestyle phase of this event.
- 7. Any props to be used for the freestyle MUST be presented to the Judge for approval prior to the competitor commencing the obstacle phase. If approved by the judge, props MUST be carried by the competitor during the obstacle phase.
- 8. Competitors must carry a stock whip in hand throughout the course.
- 9. Competitors will be timed, and a bell will mark the end of the set time for both the obstacle and the freestyle.
- 10. Once time has been called on the obstacle course, the competitor must finish at that point and leave the course. Points will only be scored for obstacles completed prior to time being called.
- 11. If time is signalled, the competitor will not be permitted to continue and will only score points for completed obstacles.
- 12. Both the start and the finishing lines must be crossed the latter only if the course has been completed within the set time.
- 13. If there is more than one competitor with the highest point score, the fastest time will determine the winner of this event.
- 14. Competitors must always follow the instructions of the judge and stewards
- 15. The judge's decision is final.

STRIPLINGS PACKHORSE

Competition Arena: Packhorse Arena

Briefing: A briefing and course walk will take place prior to each group commencing.

Packhorses and packsaddles will be supplied by the Challenge Committee. Packhorses will be already saddled and packed ready for course.

Rules

- 1. All competitors must always wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet during this event.
- 2. One attempt will be allowed at each of the 5 obstacles. If the first attempt is unsuccessful, the competitor will be asked to move on, and zero points will be scored for that obstacle.
- 3. Competitors ARE NOT required to carry a stockwhip during this event.
- 4. Competitors must complete all the tasks within a set time. Once time has been called, the competitor must finish at that point. Points will only be scored for tasks and obstacles completed prior to time being called.
- 5. If there is more than one competitor with the highest point score, the fastest time will determine the winner of this event
- 6. Competitors must always follow the instructions of the judge and stewards
- 7. The judge's decision is final.
- 8. Competitors will be required to:
- COMPLETE THE SET PACKSADDLE TASK UNMOUNTED WITHIN A 2 MINUTE TIME LIMIT
- COMPLETE THE SET OBSTACLE COURSE MOUNTED WHILST LEADING PACK HORSE (SUPPLIED BY COMMITTEE)

STRIPLINGS WHIP CRACK

Competition Arena: Campdraft Arena

Briefing: A briefing and course walk will take place prior to each group commencing.

RULES

All competitors must wear an Equestrian Australia approved helmet at all times whilst mounted

The course will comprise 2 HIGH, 3 LOW & 3 MEDIUM TARGETS & A BONUS TARGET/OBSTACLE OF 20 POINTS.

The course will suit left or right-handed riders.

The targets will be either horizontal or vertical.

Competitors must not stop at a target. They must be moving forward at all times.

- Competitors must cleanly cut all targets in order to gain maximum points.
- 2. Targets must be cut in a forward motion with a stockman's crack.
- 3. Only one attempt at each target is permitted.

If time is signalled, the competitor will not be permitted to continue and will only score points for targets cut prior to time be called.

- If there is more than one competitor with the highest point score, the fastest time will win.
- 5. Each competitor will walk the course with the judge in their groups prior to commencement of the course. Competitors must follow the instructions of the judge and stewards at all times. A time limit will be announced during the walk trough of each group.
- 6. The judge's decision is final.
